ISSUE

The issue for the Committee is to consider recommending to council to support the Cities of Snohomish Public Safety Coalition to support public safety policy initiatives and legislative efforts including a one-time payment of \$3,750.

BACKGROUND

In September, mayors from 15 Snohomish County cities launched a new coalition to develop and implement policies that address ongoing community concerns about public safety in the county.

The Cities of Snohomish Public Safety Coalition was created in response to increased incidents of property and violent crime across Snohomish County, and to address mental health and homelessness challenges that are primary drivers of the increase. The coalition will also address legislative actions that have contributed to the problem and constrained local efforts to stem criminal activity.

In the coming legislative session, the coalition will pursue a coordinated agenda that includes:

- Legislation addressing the Blake decision, which decriminalized nearly all drug possession in Washington state.
- Criminal justice policies that will allow officers to use their training, experience and judgment more effectively in the field.
- Increased funding for both law enforcement and social services.

FISCAL IMPACT

Based on population, the recommended participation level for Stanwood is \$3,750. This would be a general fund expense. Although it is not currently included in the budget it will not require a budget amendment.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends support for the Coalition's efforts and a one-time payment of \$3,750.

COMPSTAT REPORT



What is CompStat?

CompStat stands for 'Computer Statistics' dealing specifically with crime. It is found to be an effective way to accurately track crime and use the information to deploy officers to address it in timely manner. It is a performance management system that is used to reduce crime and achieve other police department goals. It emphasizes information-sharing, responsibility and accountability and improving effectiveness.

What is the benefit to the community?

CompStat allows us to track crime problems and allocate resources to the areas that are being affected. By being able to focus our efforts on areas being impacted, we are able to make apprehensions and drive down crime in Stanwood.

How is data collected?

Crime Analysts access a variety of systems to collect and analyze law enforcement data. Data collection begins at the 911 call center (SNO911) and carries over into law enforcement records management systems (LERMS). Much of the information presented in this report is also reported to state and federal agencies annually.

What data will you see in this report?

What occurred within the city limits of Stanwood and calls responded to by the Stanwood Police outside the city.

This is a true representation of all police activity occurring in the City of Stanwood, you will see these calls listed as "In the STW Beat". On occasion, Stanwood Police officers will be called outside the city to assist other agencies. We also have deputies who live outside of the city so on occasion they will make a traffic stop or respond to a nearby call while commuting to work. You will see these call listed as "Answered by STW ORI"

Incident data:

This represents what police were called to and includes self-initiated activity. Multiple 911 calls for the same incident are presented as a single incident.

Case data:

An incident becomes a case when the deputy determines reporting protocol is met. A case is often generated based on a specific crime, traffic collisions, arrest or the need to document specific actions or information.

POLICE STAFFING



The City of Stanwood contracts for law enforcement services through the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office. The contract is identified as a "stand alone" contract, which allows the City of Stanwood to maintain its own police identity to include policies and procedures that meet unique small city needs. All uniforms and vehicles are identified as Stanwood Police and we provide services to the city population of approximately 8,405.

DIVISIONS:

CHIEF OF POLICE: Has the rank of Lieutenant with the Sheriff's Office. Oversees all aspects of the Police Department daily operations. The Chief works with city staff to ensure community needs are met.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERGEANT: Administers the day-to-day administrative functions of the Police Department and oversees the day shift deputies, School Resource Officer and Detective. Steps in as the Chief of Police when the chief is absent.

NIGHT SERGEANT: Oversees the swing shift and night shift deputies.

PATROL DIVISION: Responds to crimes in progress, traffic collisions, missing persons, and other emergency and non-emergency calls for service.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER: Utilizes the concept of educator, informal counselor, and law enforcer; working to bridge the gap and build relationships between law enforcement and youth.

DETECTIVE: Works in conjunction with patrol and the resources of the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office to investigate a broad range of felony- and misdemeanor-level crimes that occurred in the City of Stanwood.

RECORDS UNIT



Records Summary: Job duties include, but are not limited to, the following;

- Provide administrative support for all members of the Stanwood Police Department.
- Assist the Chief of Police with police budget tracking and review.
- Verify and code all incoming invoices for the Police Department.
- Ordering of supplies for the department, and special events.
- Subject matter expert for the Law Enforcement Records Management System (LERMS) used by Stanwood Police Department.
- Manage all Stanwood Police Department documents and records.
- Review all electronic case file entries and information for accuracy.
- Scan paper records into electronic case files.
- Forward criminal arrest referrals to the Prosecuting Attorney's Office.
- Enter trespass notices, gun alerts, and other safety alerts into the agency's electronic records management system.
- Route Child Protective Services & Adult Protective Service referrals.
- Maintain department case file and document archives per Washington State records retention/destruction schedules.
- Responsible for federal reporting of crime statistics to the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS).
- Run monthly case audits and records validations.
- Enter court orders, missing persons, vehicle impounds, lost or stolen property, stolen vehicles, etc. into Washington Crime Information Center and National Crime Information Center (WACIC/NCIC).
- Provide second checks for all entries made into Washington Crime Information Center and National Crime Information Center (WACIC/NCIC).
- Conduct background checks for concealed pistol license and pistol transfers applications.
- Provide fingerprint services for concealed pistol license applicants and citizen fingerprints.
- Review and fulfill public records requests within the guidelines of the Public Records Act.
- Create/update/maintain all process, procedure, and training manuals for the position.
- Serve as Stanwood Police Department's Terminal Agency Coordinator for the Washington State Patrol ACCESS program.
- Assists with walk-in and telephone customers, averaging 8,000 yearly contacts.
- Route calls to 911 and non-emergency dispatch.
- Respond to requests for service and answer general questions.
- Manage key & key fob assignments for City of Stanwood employees.

Message from the Chief



November is such a great month. In November we have the opportunity to honor our veterans and a few weeks later gather with friends and family for Thanksgiving. November is also when football is in full swing as our local Spartans had a great season, depending on what side of the fence you are on, the Apple Cup was a success or disappointment, and even the Seahawks aren't doing too bad. November also brings winter weather as our officers were busy when the big windstorm hit, dealing with down trees and power lines in the roadways. Thankfully we ended the month with the "atmospheric river" and "Snowmageddon" melting by morning, disappointing my kids that school was still on.

Crime Issues:

On 11/10/2022 a subject left his home near Lake Ketchum after making suicidal threats. Later that night Officer Leon contacted the subject in his vehicle parked in front of a tavern in town. The subject was detained having a loaded firearm, two 50 round magazines, four 15 round magazines, smoke grenade, and body armor. The subject told Officer Leon he had planned to commit suicide but would not give any more details. The subject was involuntarily committed to the hospital and seen by a Mental Health Professional on a 72-hour hold. Additionally, we charged the subject with a weapons crime and had an Extreme Risk Protection Order issued. This allowed us to search the subject's residence and confiscate any firearms, along with barring the subject's ability to purchase or possess firearms in the future.

There was a break-in at the Ace Hardware store. The suspects entered through a back door and took a tool set, Christmas lights, and extension cords. There is good video evidence of the suspects and their vehicle.

Currently Detective Martin is following leads in hopes of identifying the suspects.

Overall crime in the city of Stanwood is mostly low-level property crimes, domestic disturbances at night, and a few hot spots with speeders.

Community Engagement:

I had the opportunity to speak to a couple of citizen groups this month. I stopped by for lunch at the Lincoln Hill Senior Center and got to hear some great stories about Stanwood back in the day. Additionally, I spoke at the Cedarhome Elementary School Watchdog kickoff event, they had over 200 Watchdogs in attendance. It was awesome to see so many men take the opportunity to support and be involved with our schools.

On a personal note, over Thanksgiving I traveled with my family to Ensenada, Mexico and helped build a home for an impoverished family that was living in shack with a dirt floor and tarped roof. It was a good opportunity for my family to be a small part in helping during this holiday season and just another reminder on how blessed we are to live in such a great community.

Detective Report



Stanwood Police Case 2022-6618 Theft

On 11-04-2022 two males parked a car behind a local hardware store at about 3:30am. The subjects removed several items from a fenced storage area behind the business after using bolt cutters on the access gate.

Images of the males and associated vehicle have been shared with area law enforcement.



Update-Stanwood Case 2019-8848 Burglary

On 11-11-19 at about 0408 hours Deputy Chaney (#1347) responded to an audible alarm at a local car wash and found the door to a storage room open when he arrived.

Video from the business showed a male suspect prying on the door and taking items from inside the storage area. Images of the suspect were posted on the Stanwood Police Department Facebook page.



A citizen responded to the posted images and identified the suspect as her ex-boyfriend with 100% certainty.

The suspect was arrested on 01-02-2022. He denied being involved in the burglary during an interview with Detective Martin. The subject was booked into the Snohomish County Jail on the charge of Burglary Second Degree.

On 11-22-2022 Detective Martin received notice from the Prosecutor's Office advising the case was being declined because the statute of limitations for filing charges expired on 11-11-2022.

Coach Scoma said he is proud of the players as individuals and human beings, and is hopeful for what they will accomplish in life outside of the game.

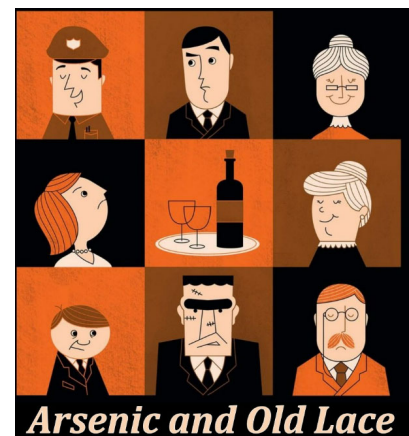


VETERANS DAY 2022 CELEBRATED

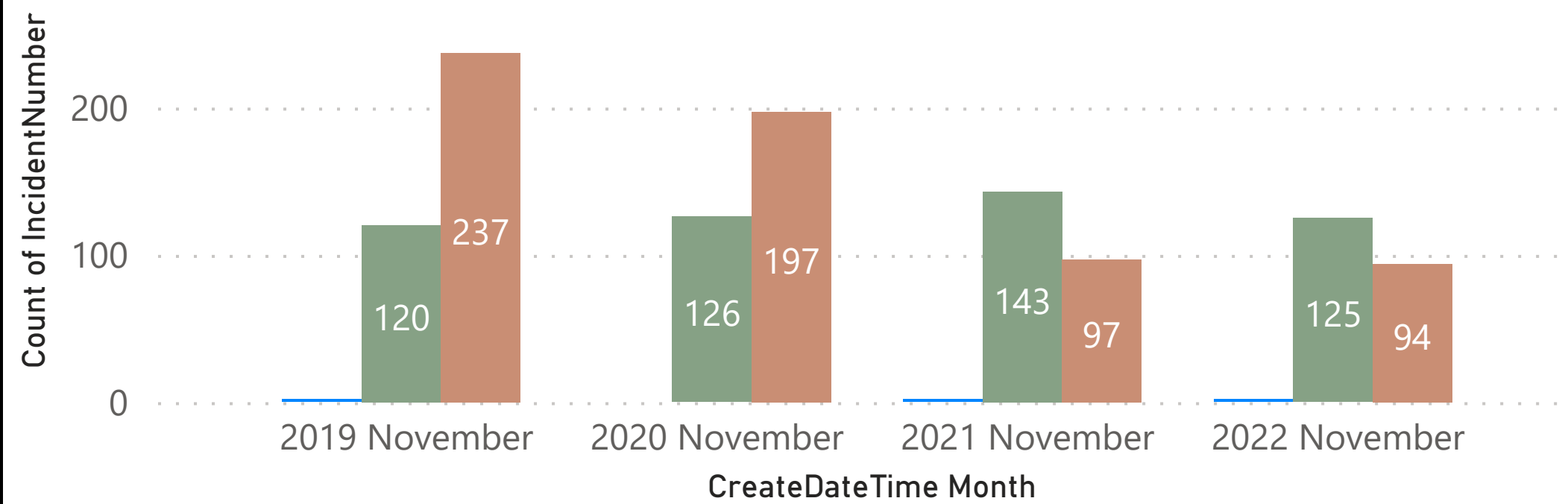

Previous Month Over Time

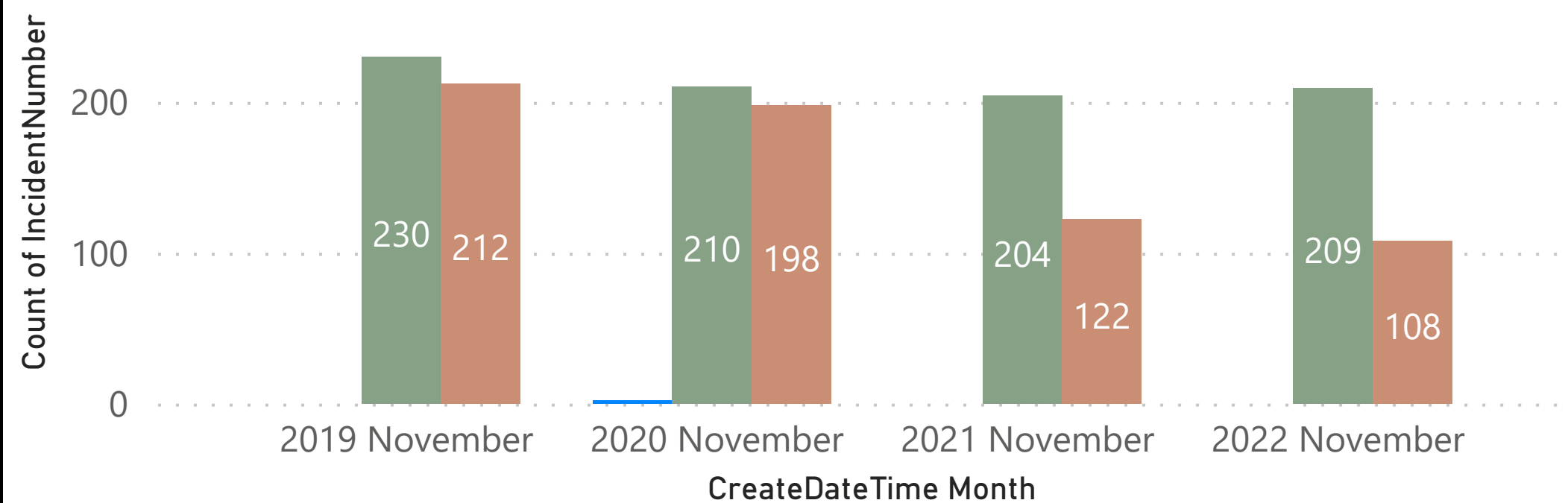
Stanwood West, Incidents by Origination

Stanwood East, Incidents by Origination

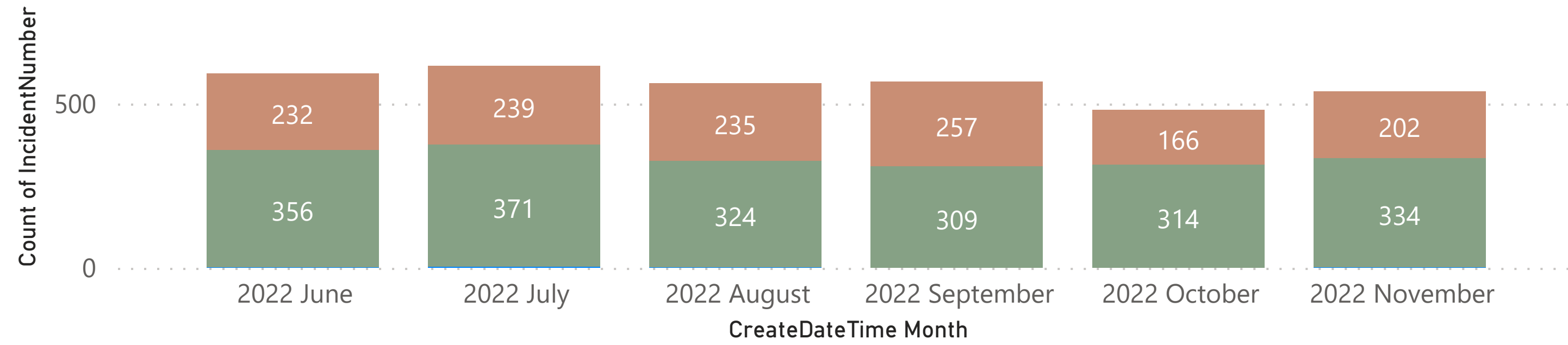

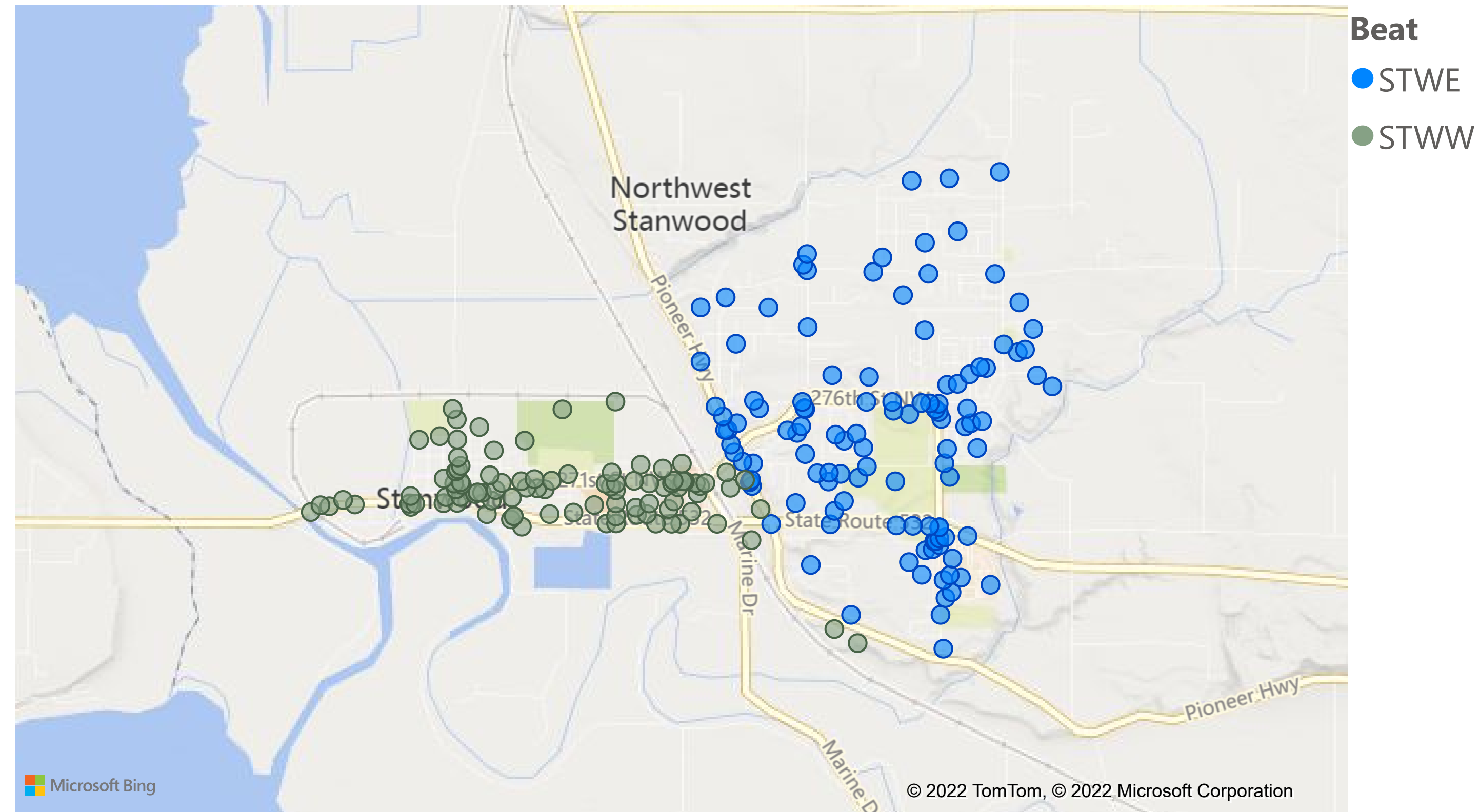
TOTAL INCIDENTS

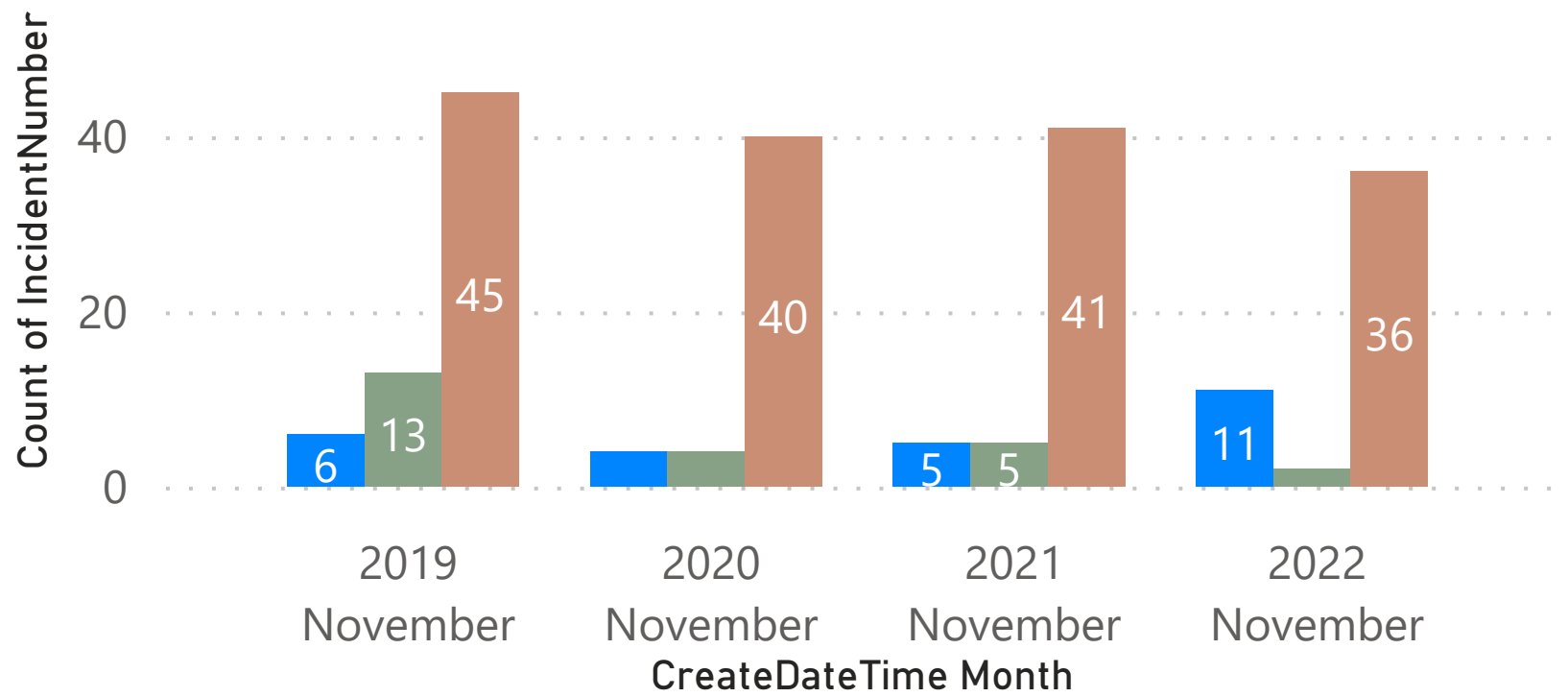

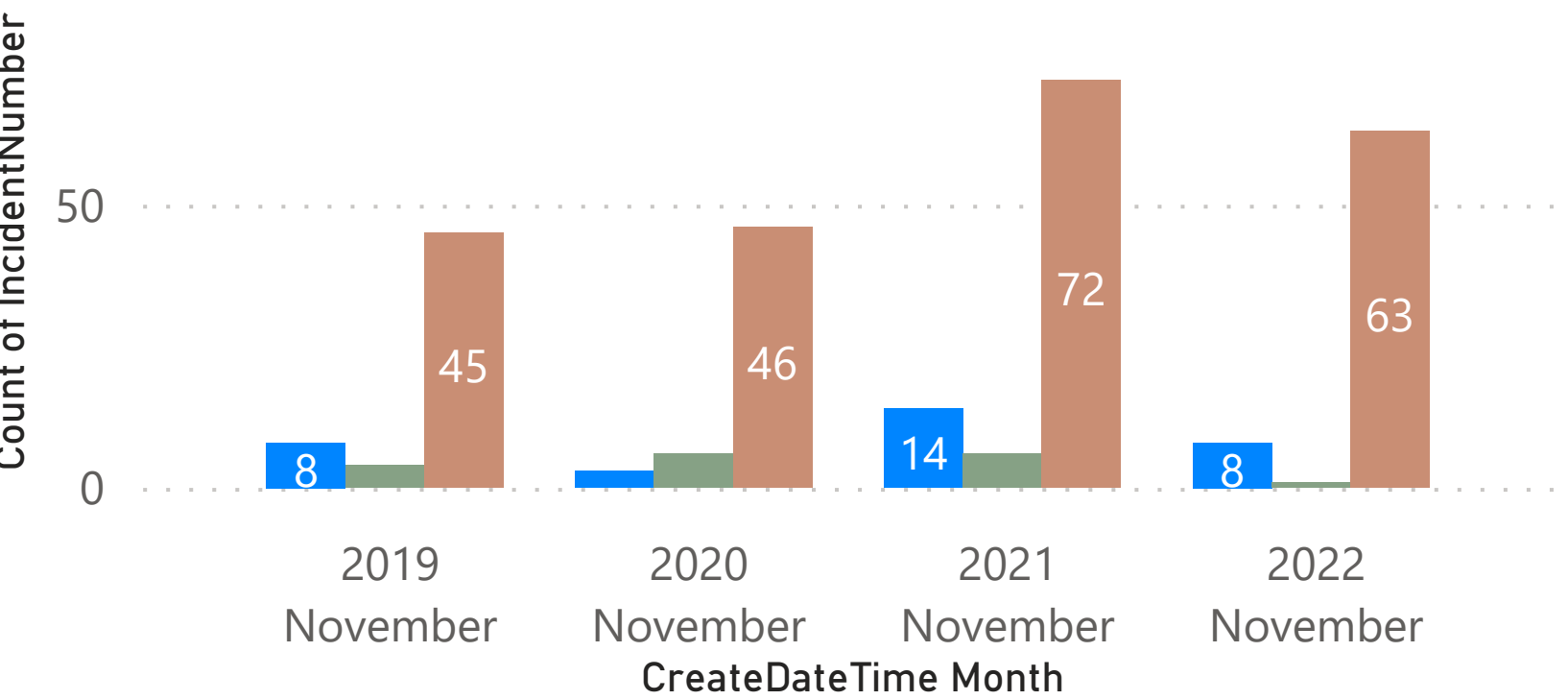

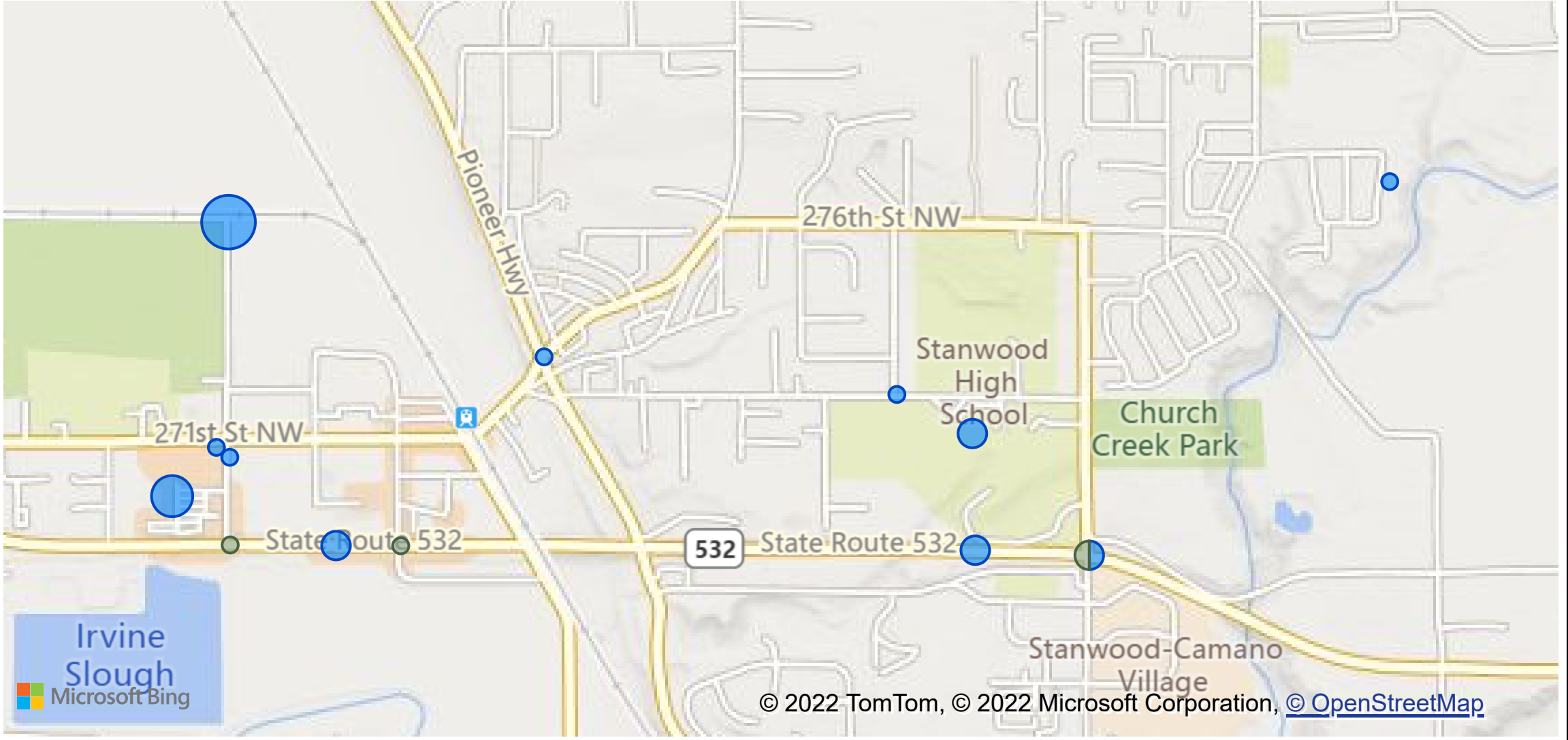
IncidentType Collision DUI Traffic

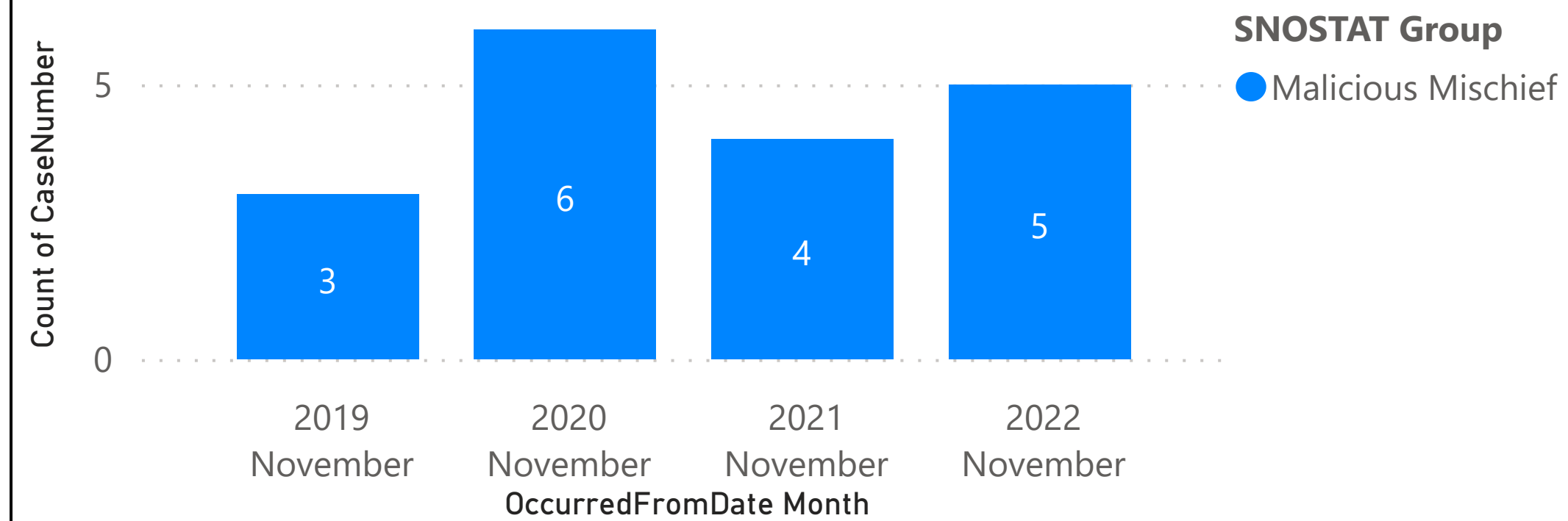

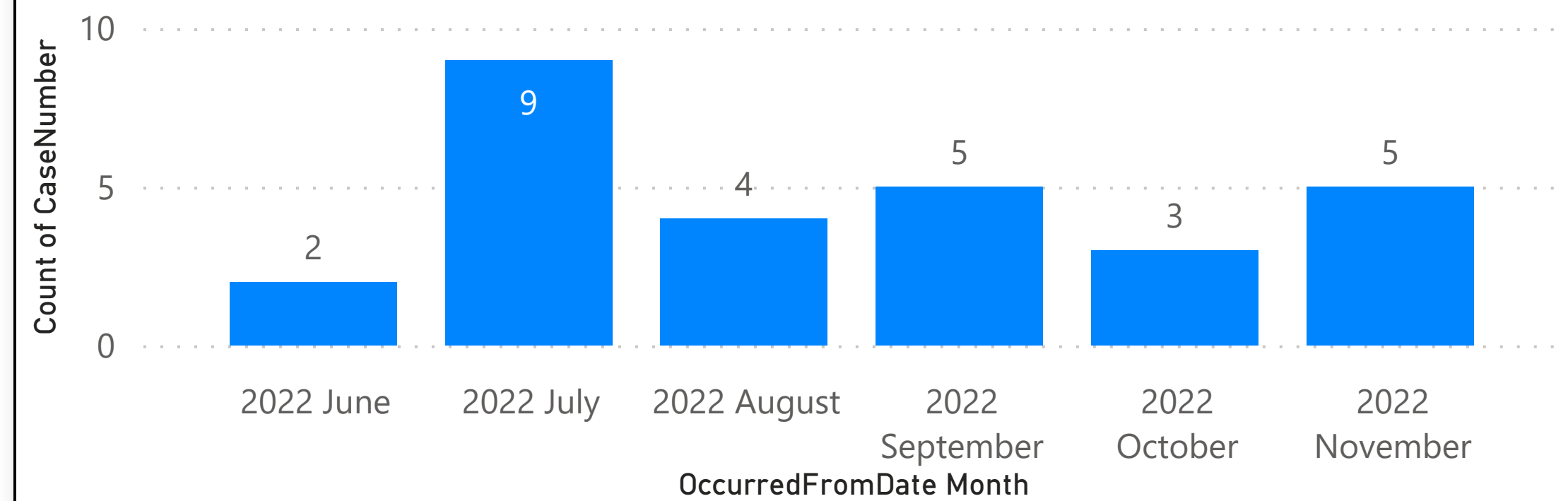

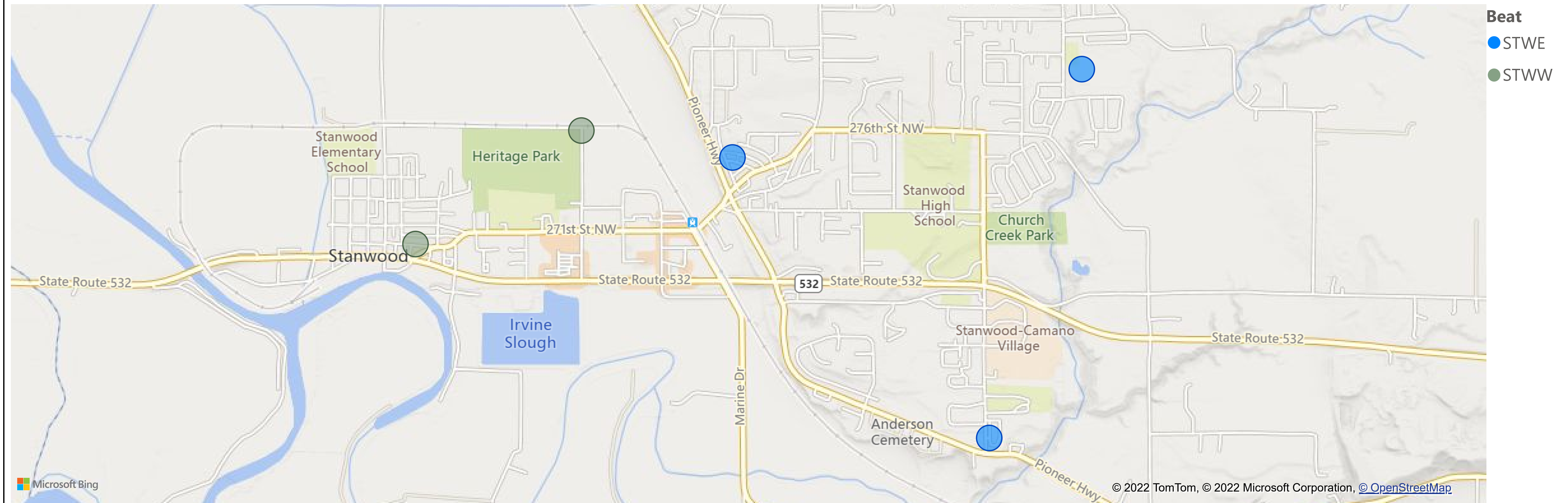
Count of CaseNumber by Year, Month and SNOSTAT Group

Cases in the past Calendar month, Current Year

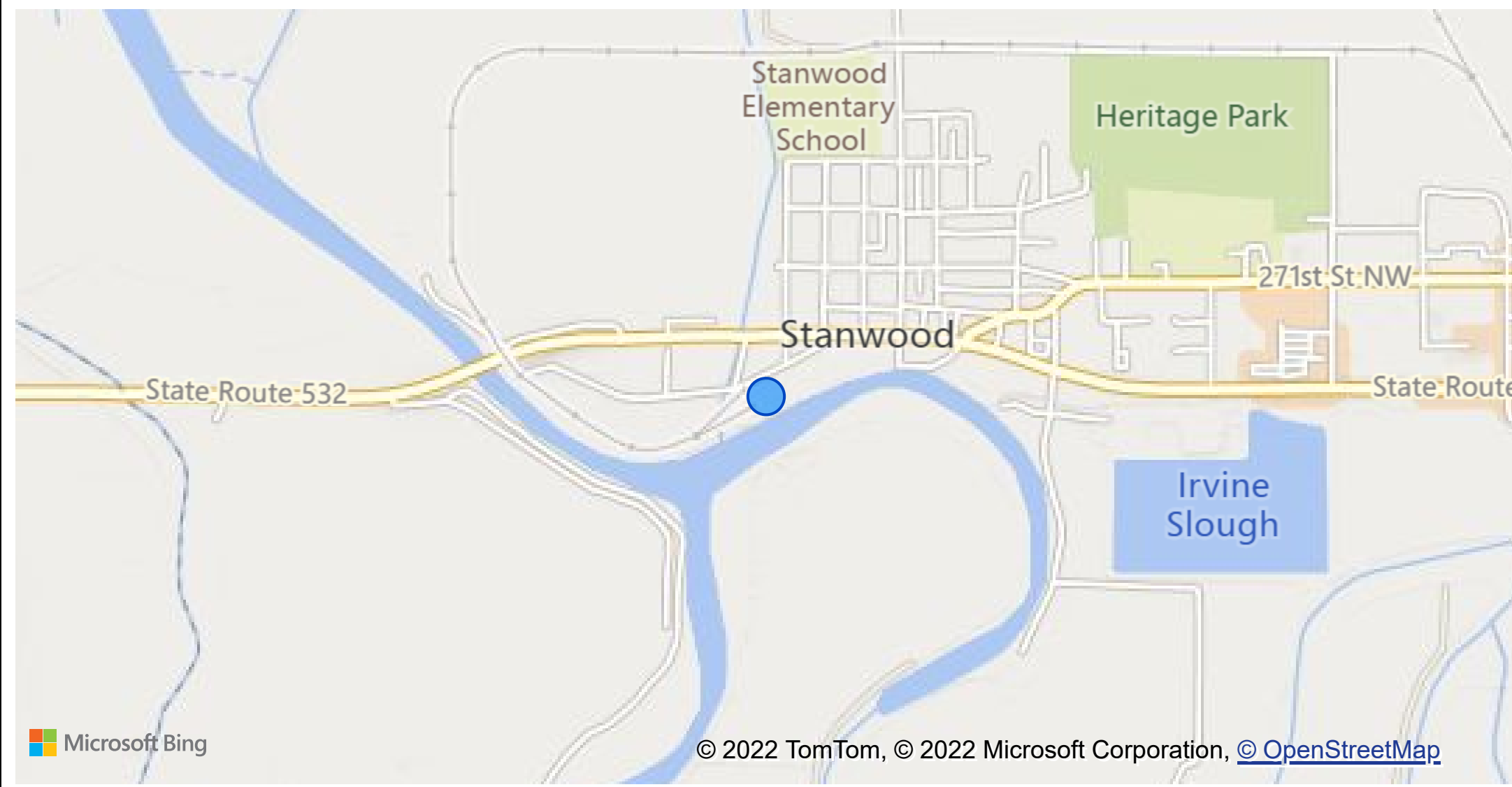

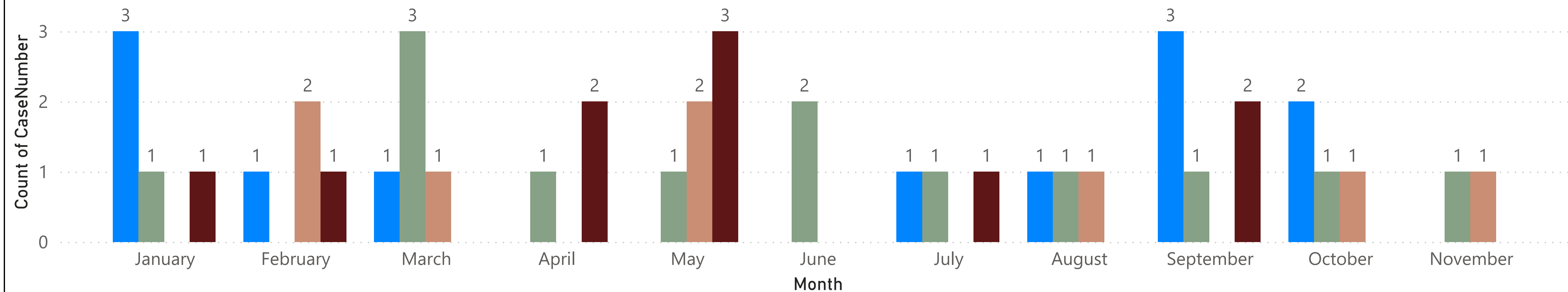

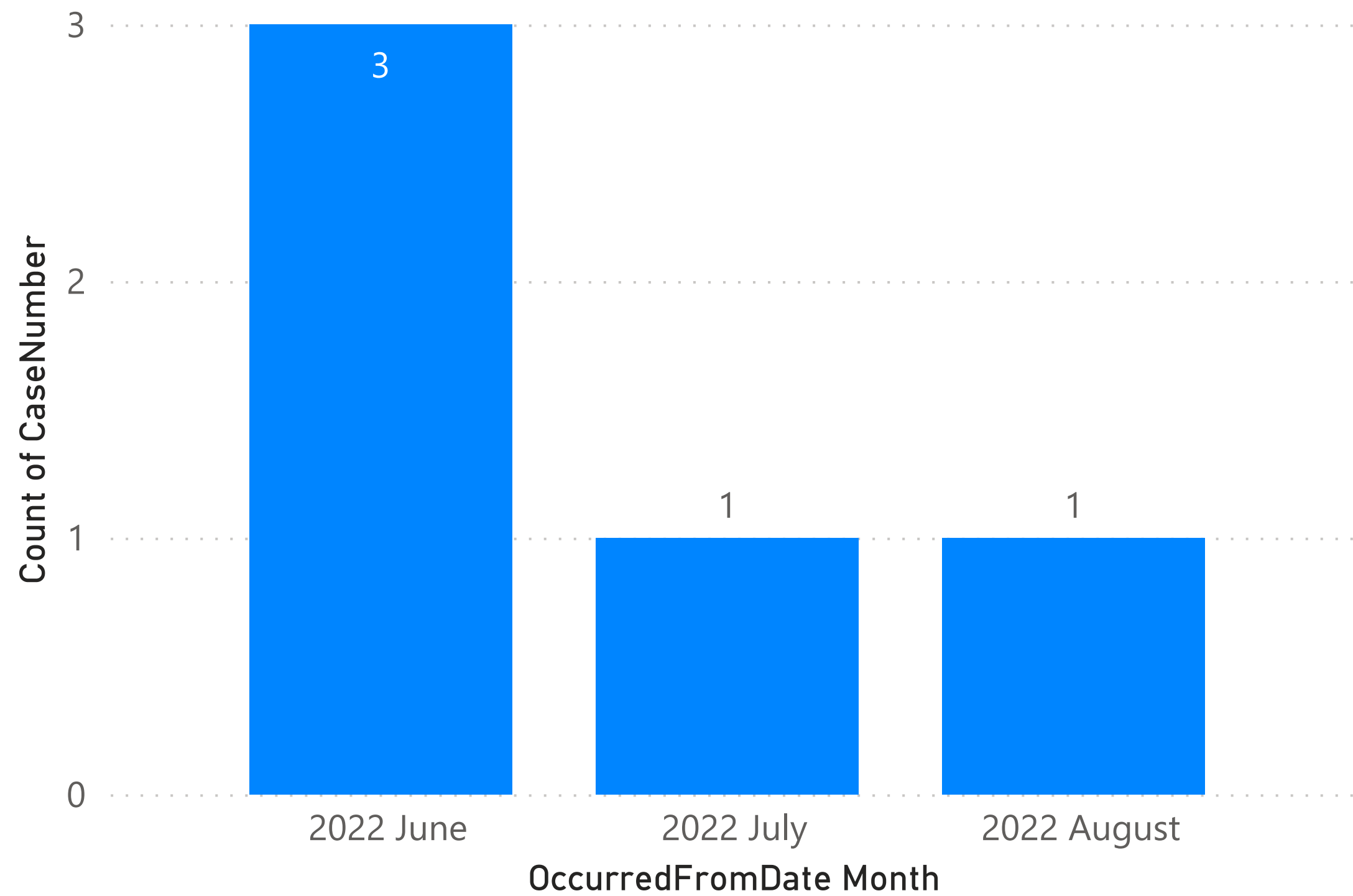
Count of CaseNumber by Year and Month

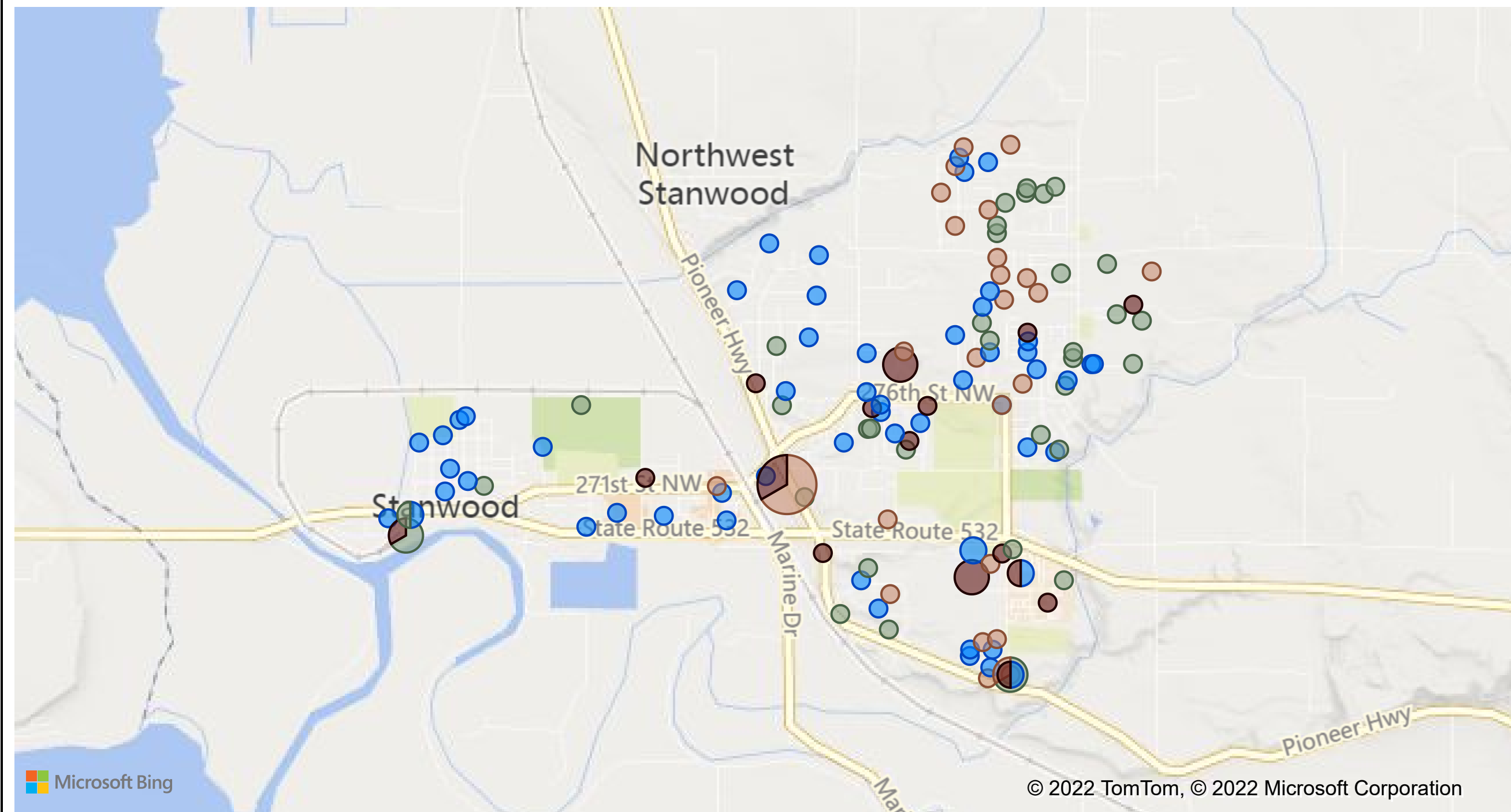

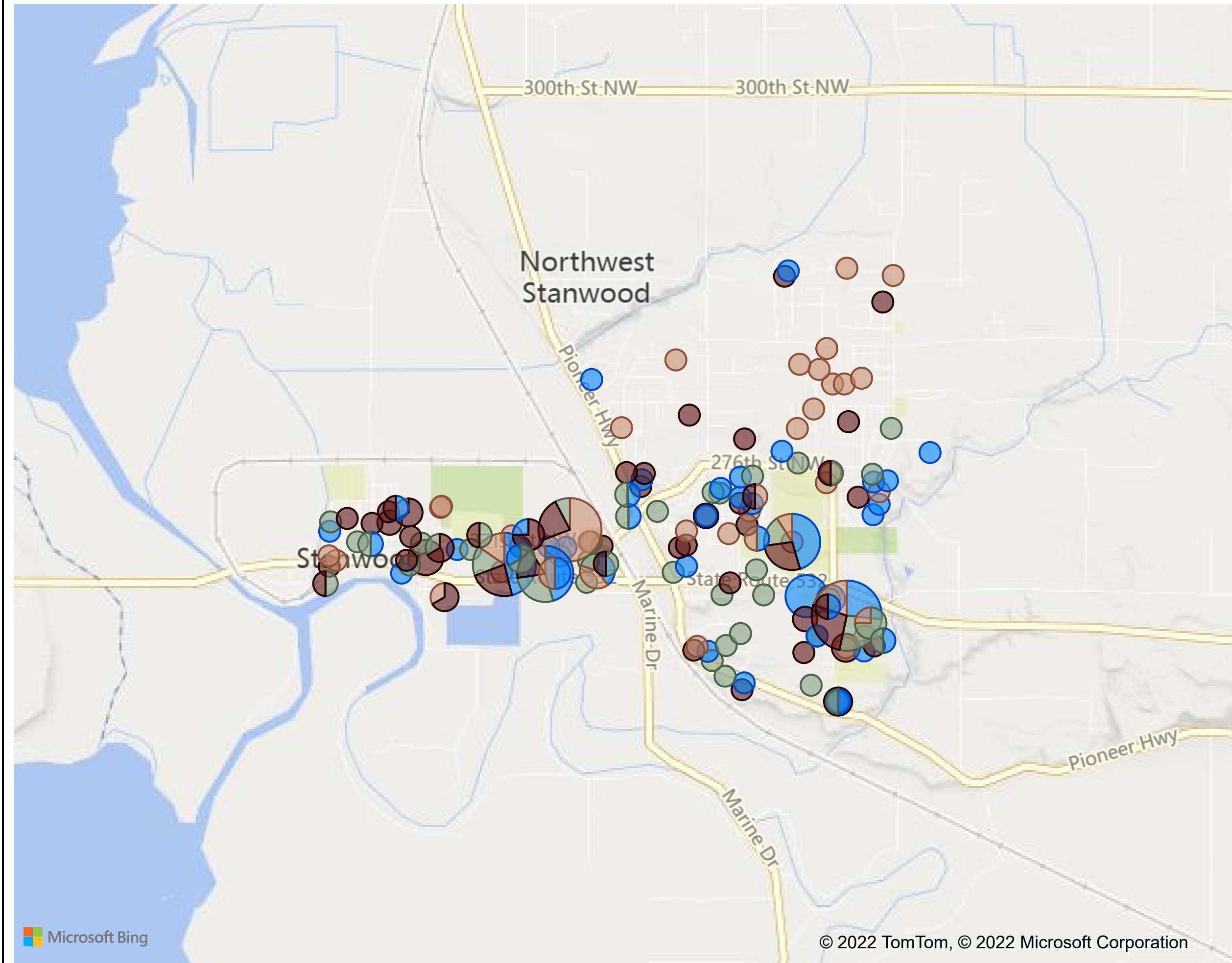

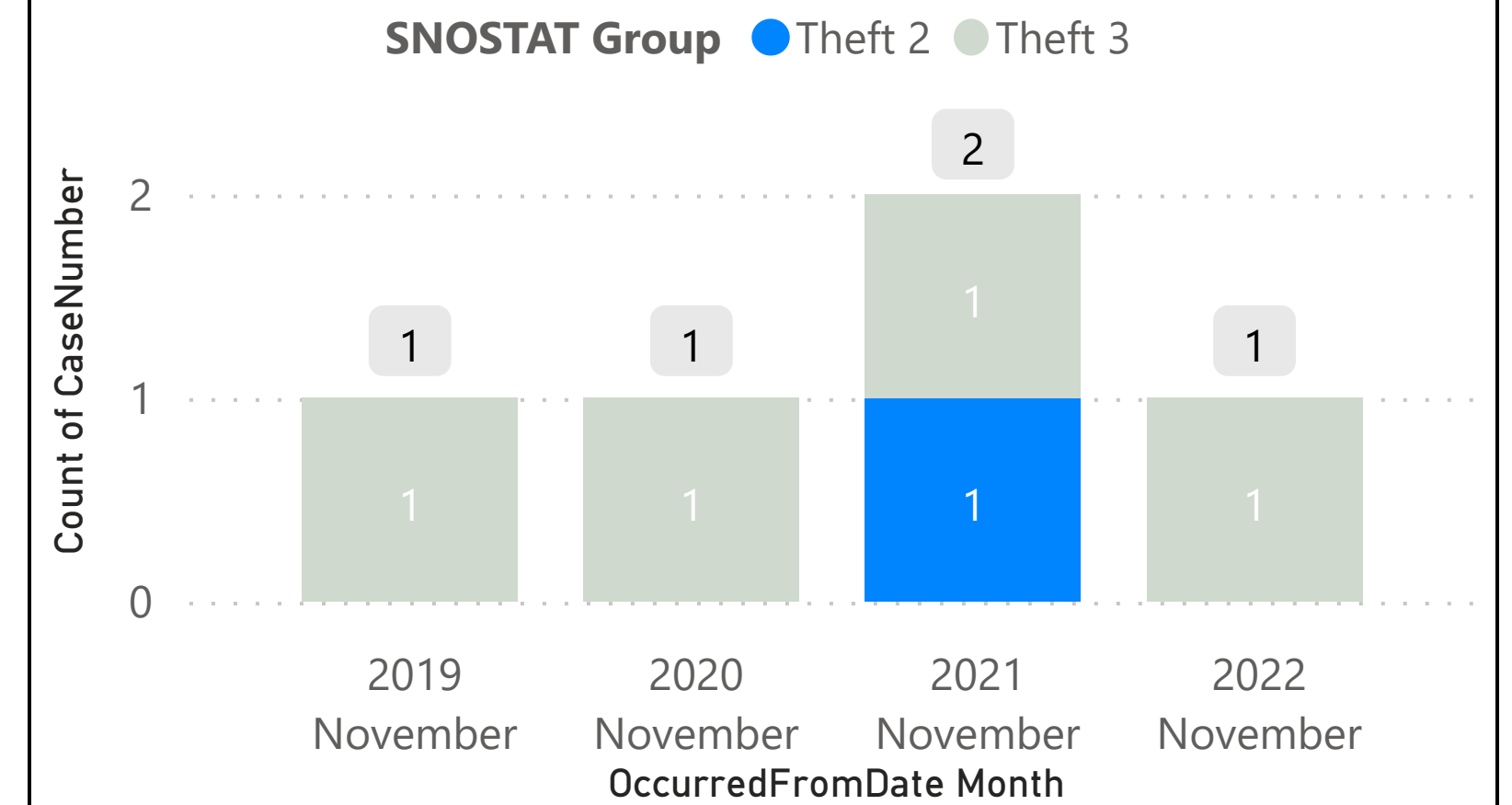

Count of CaseNumber by Year, Lat and Lon

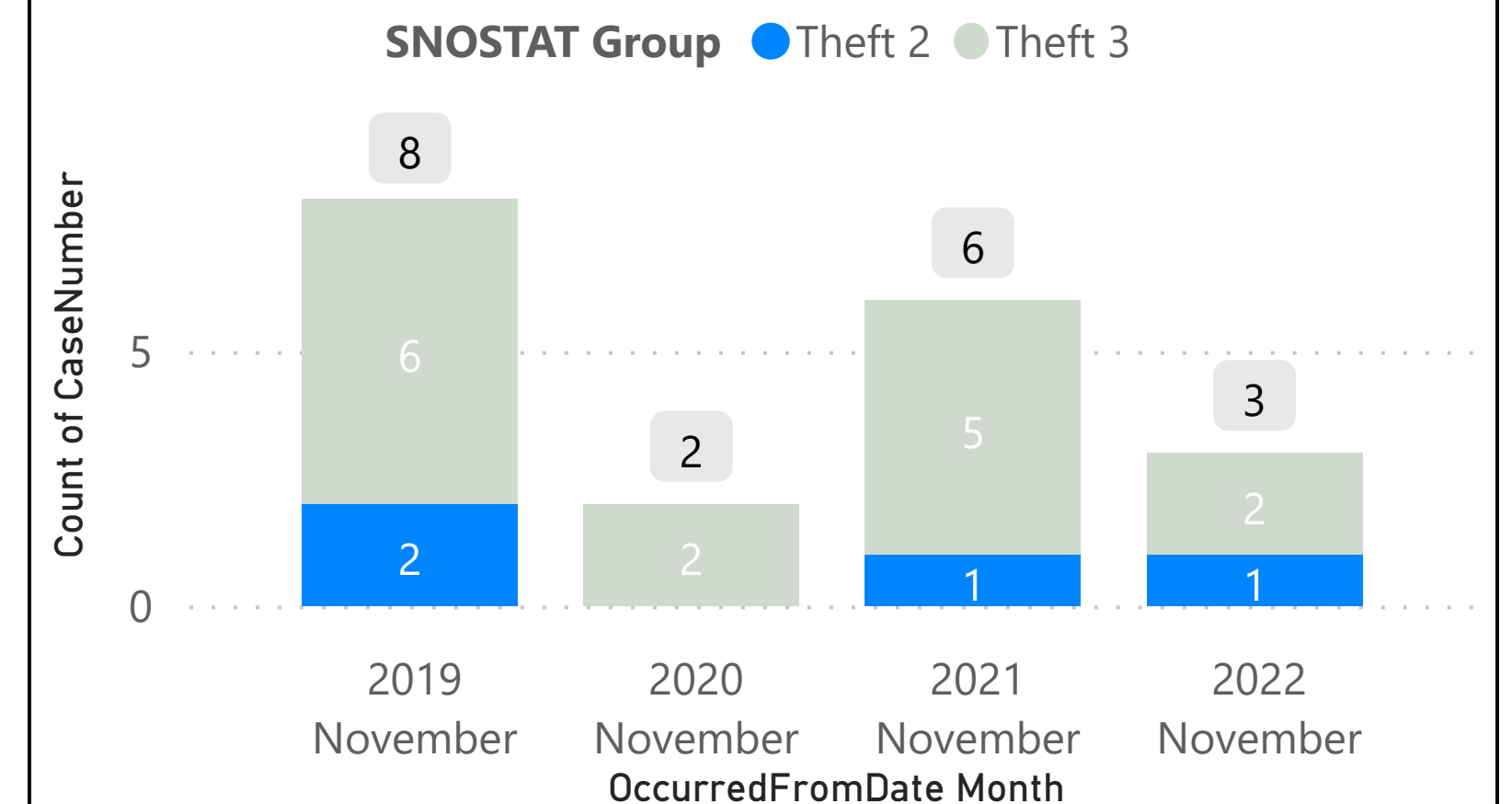

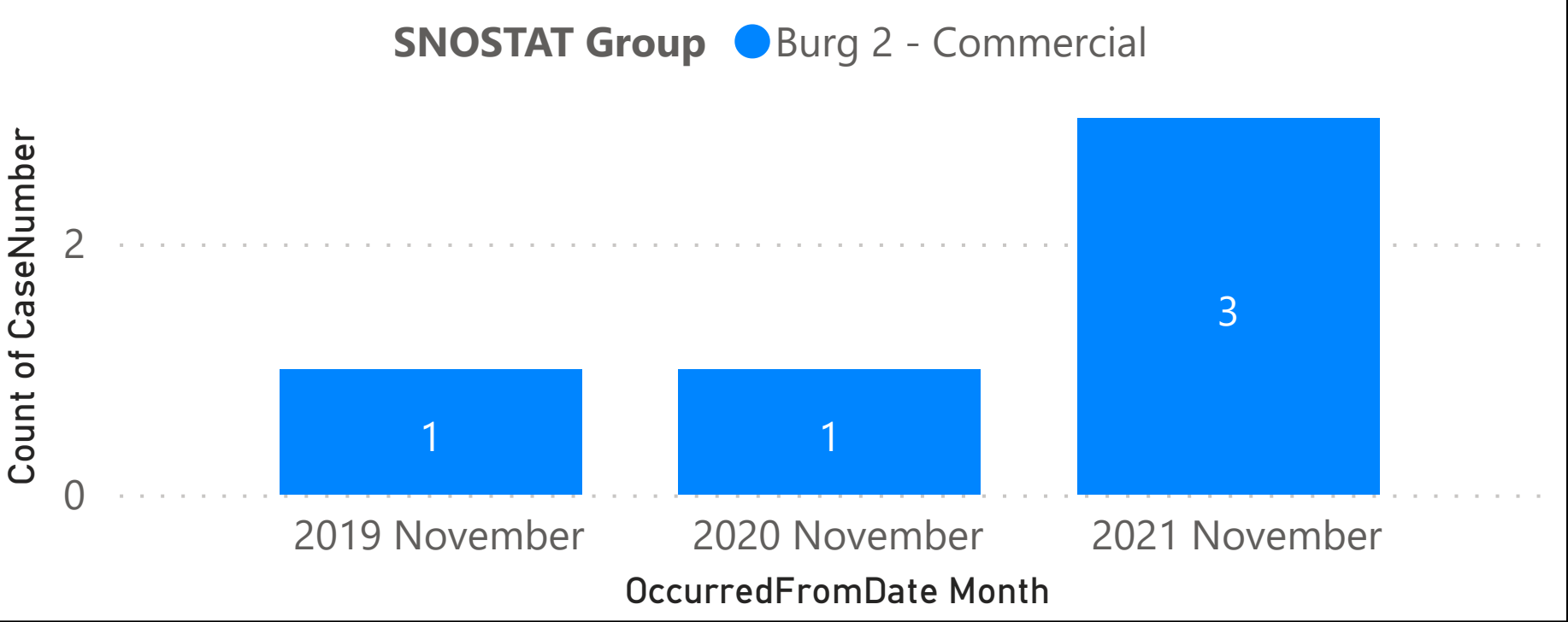

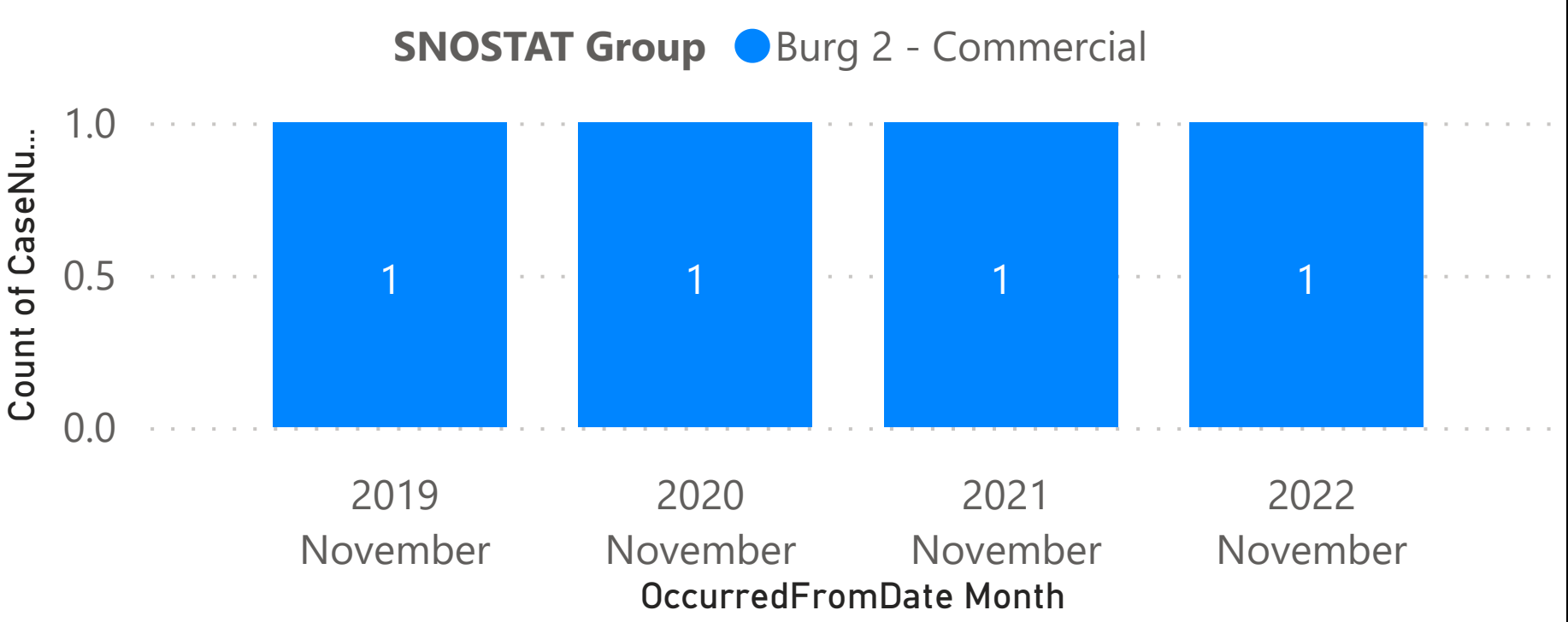
