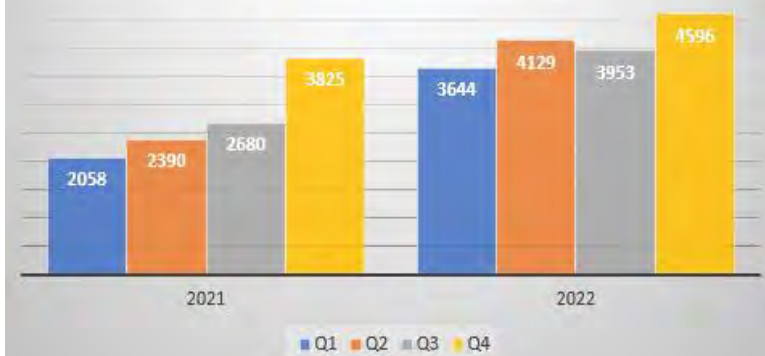

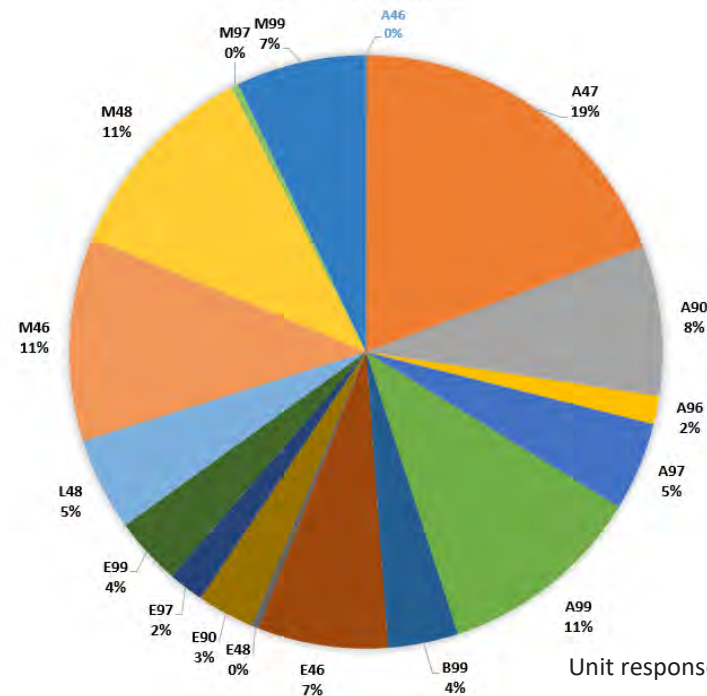

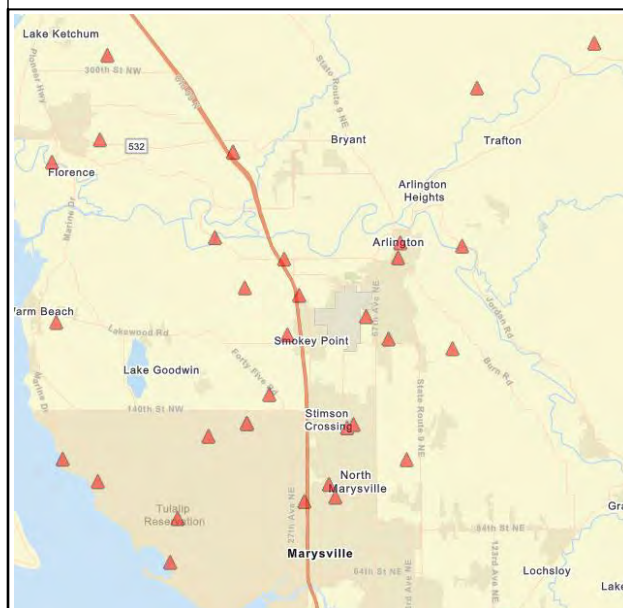

COMPSTAT REPORT



What is CompStat?

CompStat stands for 'Computer Statistics' dealing specifically with crime. It is found to be an effective way to accurately track crime and use the information to deploy officers to address it in timely manner. It is a performance management system that is used to reduce crime and achieve other police department goals. It emphasizes information-sharing, responsibility and accountability and improving effectiveness.

What is the benefit to the community?

CompStat allows us to track crime problems and allocate resources to the areas that are being affected. By being able to focus our efforts on areas being impacted, we are able to make apprehensions and drive down crime in Stanwood.

How is data collected?

Crime Analysts access a variety of systems to collect and analyze law enforcement data. Data collection begins at the 911 call center (SNO911) and carries over into law enforcement records management systems (LERMS). Much of the information presented in this report is also reported to state and federal agencies annually.

What data will you see in this report?

What occurred within the city limits of Stanwood and calls responded to by the Stanwood Police outside the city.

This is a true representation of all police activity occurring in the City of Stanwood, you will see these calls listed as "In the STW Beat". On occasion, Stanwood Police officers will be called outside the city to assist other agencies. We also have deputies who live outside of the city so on occasion they will make a traffic stop or respond to a nearby call while commuting to work. You will see these call listed as "Answered by STW ORI"

Incident data:

This represents what police were called to and includes self-initiated activity. Multiple 911 calls for the same incident are presented as a single incident.

Case data:

An incident becomes a case when the deputy determines reporting protocol is met. A case is often generated based on a specific crime, traffic collisions, arrest or the need to document specific actions or information.

POLICE STAFFING



The City of Stanwood contracts for law enforcement services through the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office. The contract is identified as a "stand alone" contract, which allows the City of Stanwood to maintain its own police identity to include policies and procedures that meet unique small city needs. All uniforms and vehicles are identified as Stanwood Police and we provide services to the city population of approximately 8,405.

DIVISIONS:

CHIEF OF POLICE: Has the rank of Lieutenant with the Sheriff's Office. Oversees all aspects of the Police Department daily operations. The Chief works with city staff to ensure community needs are met.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERGEANT: Administers the day-to-day administrative functions of the Police Department and oversees the day shift deputies, School Resource Officer and Detective. Steps in as the Chief of Police when the chief is absent.

NIGHT SERGEANT: Oversees the swing shift and night shift deputies.

PATROL DIVISION: Responds to crimes in progress, traffic collisions, missing persons, and other emergency and non-emergency calls for service.

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER: Utilizes the concept of educator, informal counselor, and law enforcer; working to bridge the gap and build relationships between law enforcement and youth.

DETECTIVE: Works in conjunction with patrol and the resources of the Snohomish County Sheriff's Office to investigate a broad range of felony- and misdemeanor-level crimes that occurred in the City of Stanwood.

Message from the Chief



January is a time of setting goals, planning for the year ahead, and dreaming of warmer weather. Like most of us, my New Year's Resolutions rarely make it to February, but maybe this year I can get to March. For Stanwood PD we are starting to plan several community events, getting ready to welcome our new patrol officers to the city, and continuing to provide professional police services to our community.

The Death of Tyre Nichols

Like many of you who have seen the video of the interaction and murder of Tyre Nichols by several Memphis police officers, I am filled with several overwhelming emotions. First as citizen, man, and father I am outraged and disgusted by the actions of these officers and heartbroken for Tyre Nichols family. As a police officer for over 15 years, I am at a loss for words and understanding on how this could happen, how needless and barbaric it was, on why those officers were not able to uphold their oaths and not able to treat Tyre Nichols ethically and humanely as everyone deserves.

One of the common questions I get asked is what we (law enforcement) are doing to make sure these horrific incidents, that have happened in other states, don't happen here. The answer is quite a lot, both locally and state-wide. All our officers go through a rigorous background investigation before being hired. Any hint of the applicant being unable to treat our citizens ethically and professionally regardless of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or gender are disqualified from being a police officer. Once hired the new officer will spend 11 months in training. During this training the new officer learns the basics of being a police officer, along with de-escalation tactics, different techniques on how to use the appropriate levels of force, and training on how to deal with people with mental illness or drug addictions.

Part of the Washington State Police Reforms were another 40 hours of patrol tactic for all officers which trains the officer in use-of-force and de-escalation. In the next few month Stanwood Police Officers will be equipped with body worn cameras, which leads to better police transparency in the community, increased civility during police interactions, quicker resolutions to police complaints, corroborating evidence to assist with arrests and prosecutions, and training opportunities for our officers. Additionally, the Sheriff's Office has expanded its Office of Professional Accountability (Internal Affairs) to meet national standards and resolve complaints in a thorough, timely, and courteous manner.

Everyone of the officers in Stanwood has sworn an oath to defend and obey the Constitution of the United States, the laws of the State of Washington, and the values and mission of Snohomish County Sheriff's Office, which are Integrity, Dignity, Commitment, Pride, and Do the right thing, at the right time, for the right reason. My expectation as your chief is our officers will always uphold the law, our values, and treat everyone professionally and ethically in all situations.

Stanwood Police Staffing

Starting February 1st Stanwood PD will be back to being fully staffed. I am excited to welcome Officers Eddie Smith, Jacob Olson, Chase Marx, and Justin Hall to Stanwood. Officer Smith comes with close to 20 years of law enforcement experience. Officer Olson is relatively new to our department but comes with a lot of experience from Washington State Patrol. Officers Marx and Hall are brand new officers, graduating from the police academy this year. I am confident these new officers to our community will do a great job.

Detective Report



Stanwood Police Case 2022-7662 Vehicle Prowl and Identity Theft

On 12-19-2022 at about 1900 hours Deputy Elliott responded to vehicle prowl complaint in the parking lot of a local restaurant. The victim arrived at the location with her six-year-old-daughter in the back seat of the car. The victim parked and left the car running with the doors unlocked when she went inside the store to pick up her order. When the victim returned to her car, she noticed her purse missing. The victim's daughter told her a "lady" was in her car.

Deputy Elliott reviewed video from the security system in the victim's car and observed an adult female opening the driver's door, entering the victim's car, leaving a few seconds later and getting inside a red Ford Escape with items clutched to her chest.

The following day, Deputy Klassen collected video from a nearby business and was able to read the license plate on the suspect's vehicle. Deputy Klassen was familiar with the car and found it parked in a neighborhood on the west side of Stanwood.

Deputy Klassen contacted a female who got into the Ford Escape and immediately recognized her as the woman who prowled the victim's vehicle from the night before.

Deputy Klassen arrested the woman and interviewed her at the Stanwood Police Department. The woman eventually admitted to stealing the victim's purse from her car. The woman said her boyfriend was driving the Ford Escape and used the victim's credit cards to purchase thousands of dollars of items from several stores. The woman returned the victim's purse and some of the items purchased using the victim's credit cards.

Detective Martin collected video from Lowe's, Dick's Sporting Goods and two local gas stations, showing the boyfriend using the victim's credit cards.

A probable cause referral warrant has been issued for the arrest of both subjects.

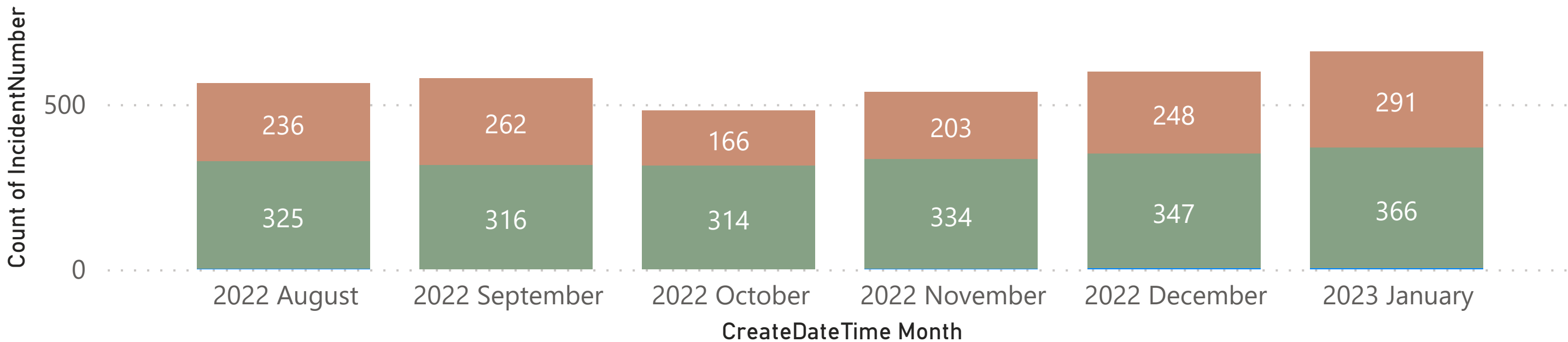


Previous Month Over Time

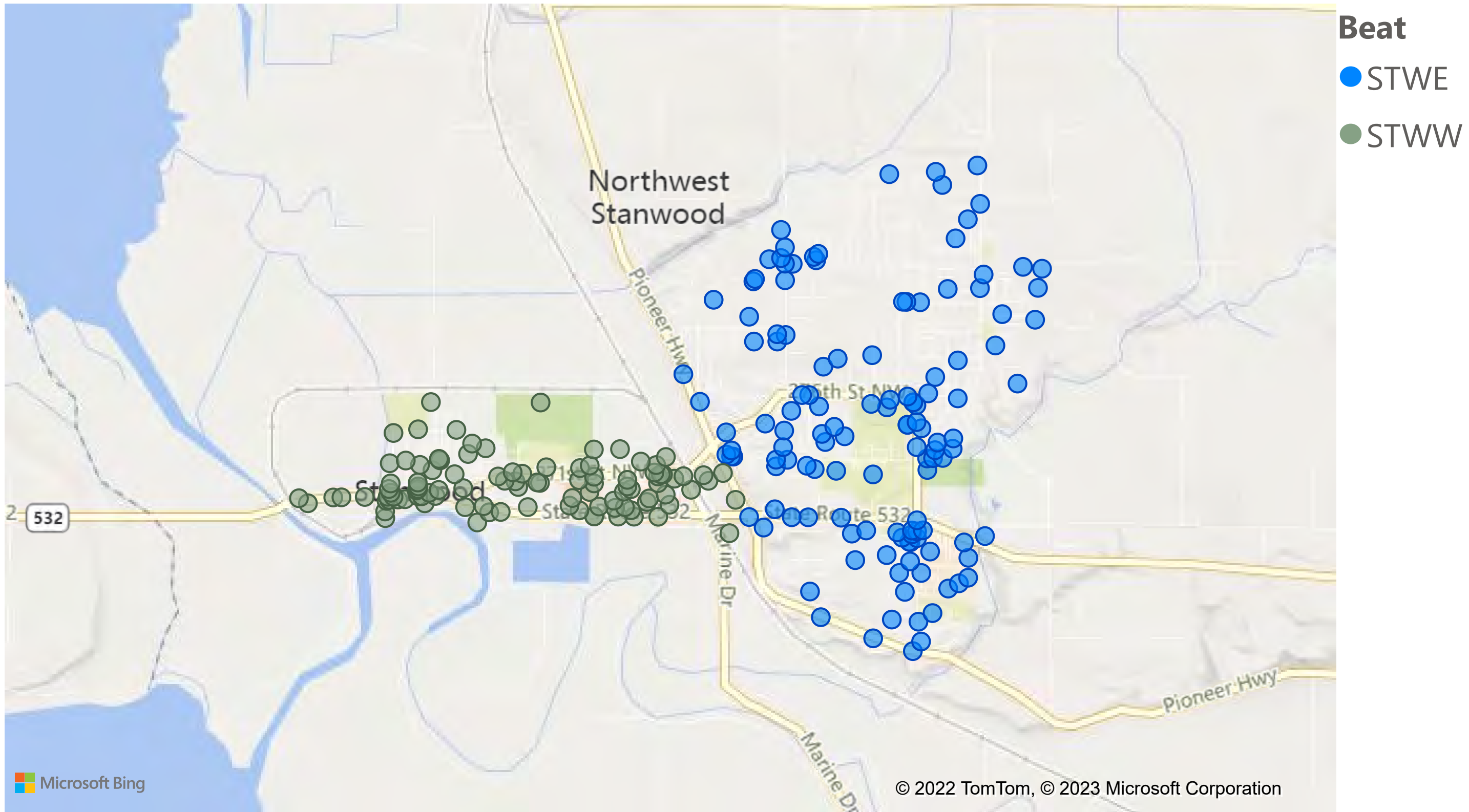

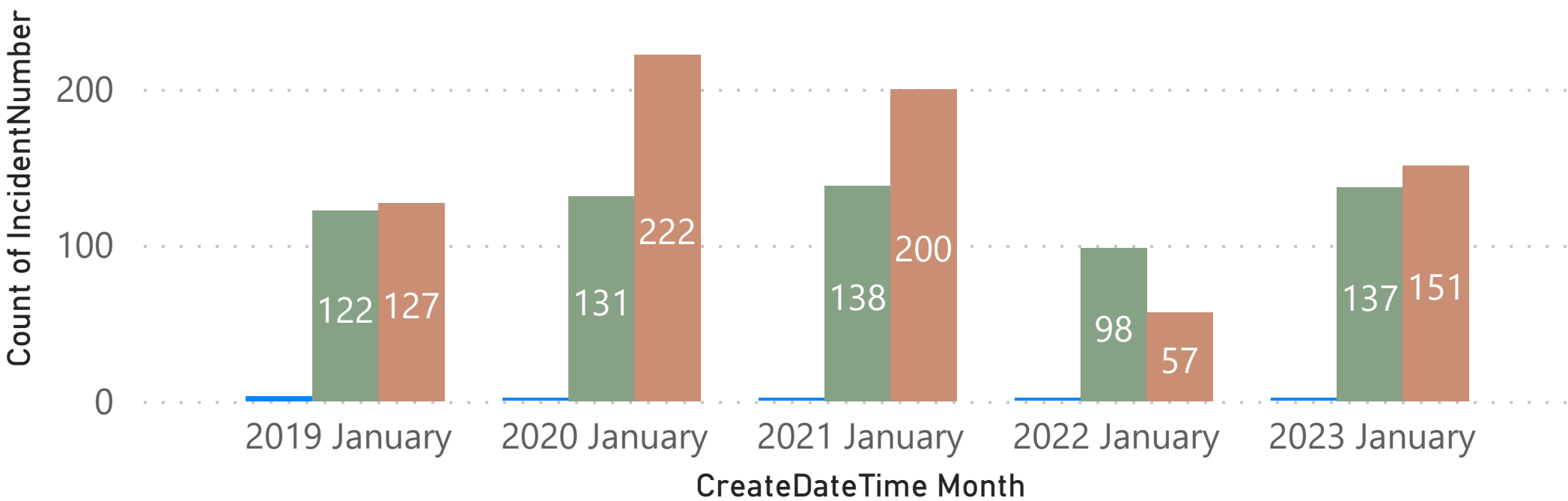

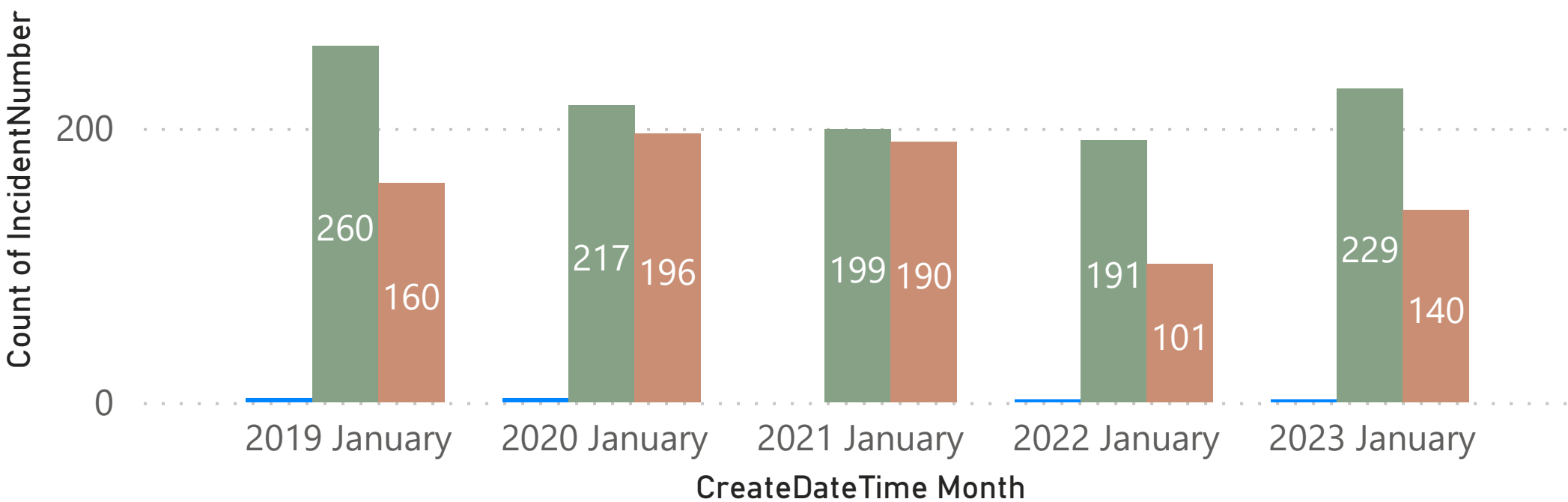
Stanwood West, Incidents by Origination

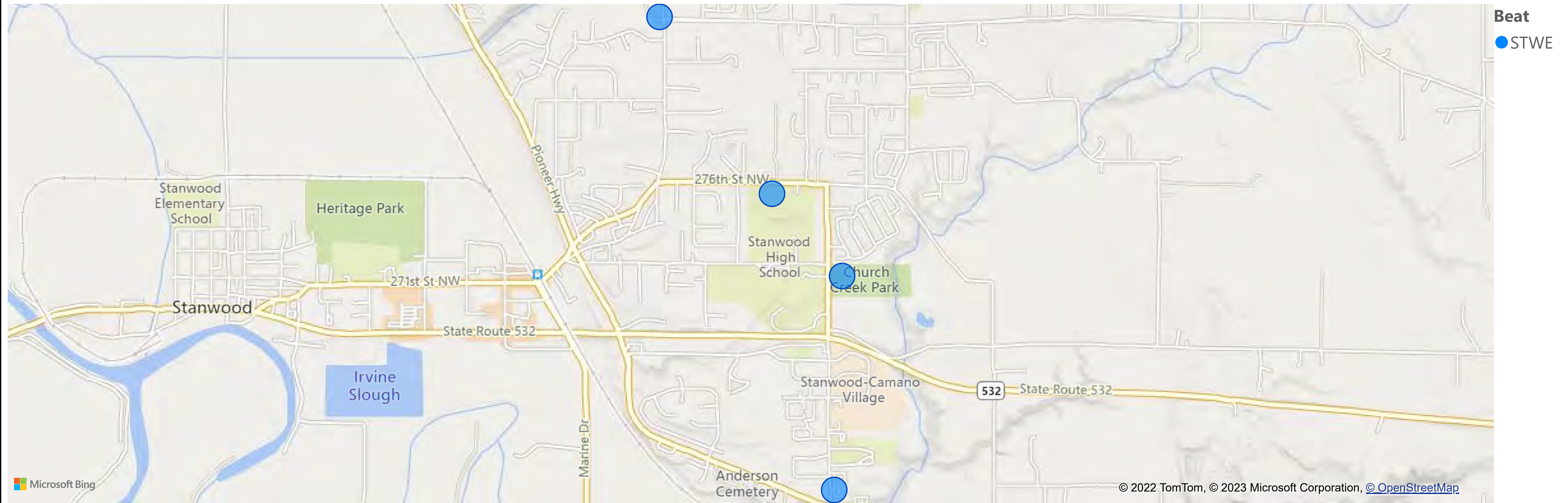
Count of CaseNumber by Year, Month and SNOSTAT Group

- Enter court orders, missing persons, vehicle impounds, lost or stolen property, stolen vehicles, etc. into Washington Crime Information Center and National Crime Information Center (WACIC/NCIC).
- Provide second checks for all entries made into Washington Crime Information Center and National Crime Information Center (WACIC/NCIC).
- Conduct background checks for concealed pistol license and pistol transfers applications.
- Provide fingerprint services for concealed pistol license applicants and citizen fingerprints.
- Review and fulfill public records requests within the guidelines of the Public Records Act.
- Create/update/maintain all process, procedure, and training manuals for the position.
- Serve as Stanwood Police Department's Terminal Agency Coordinator for the Washington State Patrol ACCESS program.
- Assists with walk-in and telephone customers, averaging 8,000 yearly contacts.
- Route calls to 911 and non-emergency dispatch.
- Respond to requests for service and answer general questions.
- Manage key & key fob assignments for City of Stanwood employees.

Message from the Chief



As we close out February, winter seems to be giving us one last snow day and traffic chaos. I personally am looking forward to hopefully nicer weather and warmer temperatures in March, as I would like to work on my golf game. In February we welcomed four new officers to town, and they are doing outstanding work.



SPIDRTECH works in conjunction with our 911 dispatch center and is a system used to communicate via text and email with 911 callers. From the time someone calls 911 through the investigation, callers are given updates on their case. These texts include updates on wait time if an officer is going to be delayed, provide updates days and weeks later on the investigation, and conduct a survey on the public's satisfaction with Stanwood PD's response and service to their call. SPIDRTECH is only used for non-violent crimes. All the agencies in Snohomish County currently use SPIDRTECH and Stanwood PD was the test agency in 2021.

I have included a copy of the 2022 SPIDRTECH Customer Communications Digest. As with any online survey, most people ignored it, but the few that did respond scored Stanwood PD and our 911 Dispatchers very high.

How satisfied with the level of respect/courtesy from the 911 Dispatcher 4.81 out of 5

How satisfied the Officer's Response to your call? 4.66 out of 5

Was the situation resolved to your satisfaction 83% Yes.

Another question the survey asks is "What are the top three issues you are most concerned about in your neighborhood? The top three answers were burglaries/thefts, vehicle prowls, and traffic/speeding issues.

Generally speaking, crime rates are very low in Stanwood and from time to time we will have an uptick vehicle prowls or burglaries, typically committed by a group of criminals from outside our community targeting our neighborhoods or businesses. Some of the things we are currently doing to combat these upticks is proactive policing where our officers are making more contacts throughout the night. Additionally for the month of March we have adjusted the hours of one of our swing officers to a so there are multiple officers on-duty later into the night.

- Drive by Shootings 16 total in 2020/2021 combined, 15 in 2022.
- Homicides 13 total in 2020/2021 combined, 11 in 2022

Average Length of stay in Jail for Felony A (Homicide, Rape, Assault w/Deadly Weapon)

- 2019- 163 Days
- 2022- 27 Days

Average Length of stay in Jail for Felony B (Manslaughter, Illegal Possession of a Firearm, Burglary, Stalking, Burglary)

- 2019-63 day
- 2022- 12 Days

Jail time is decided on by our local judges with input from prosecutors and defense attorneys. I have concerns that lack of holding people accountable for crimes is leading to higher crime rates and more violent crime.

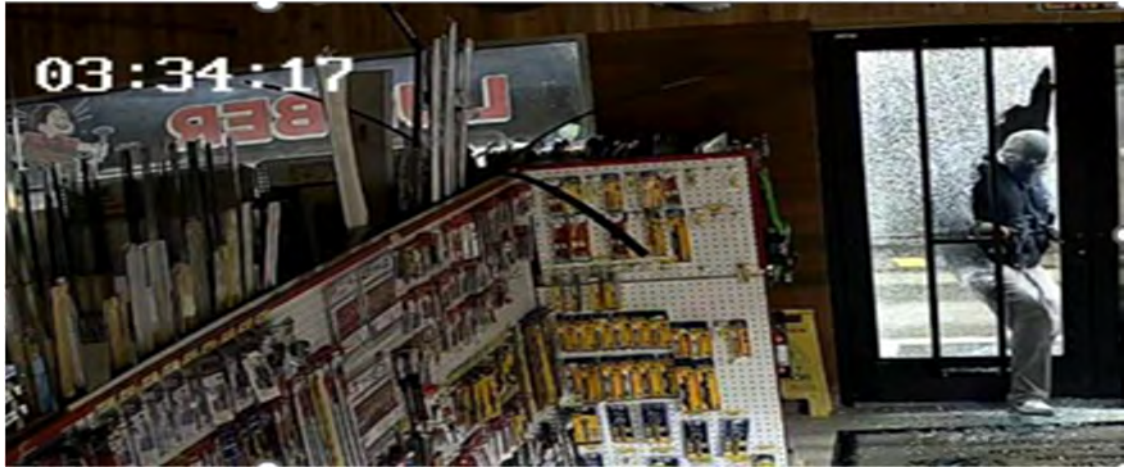

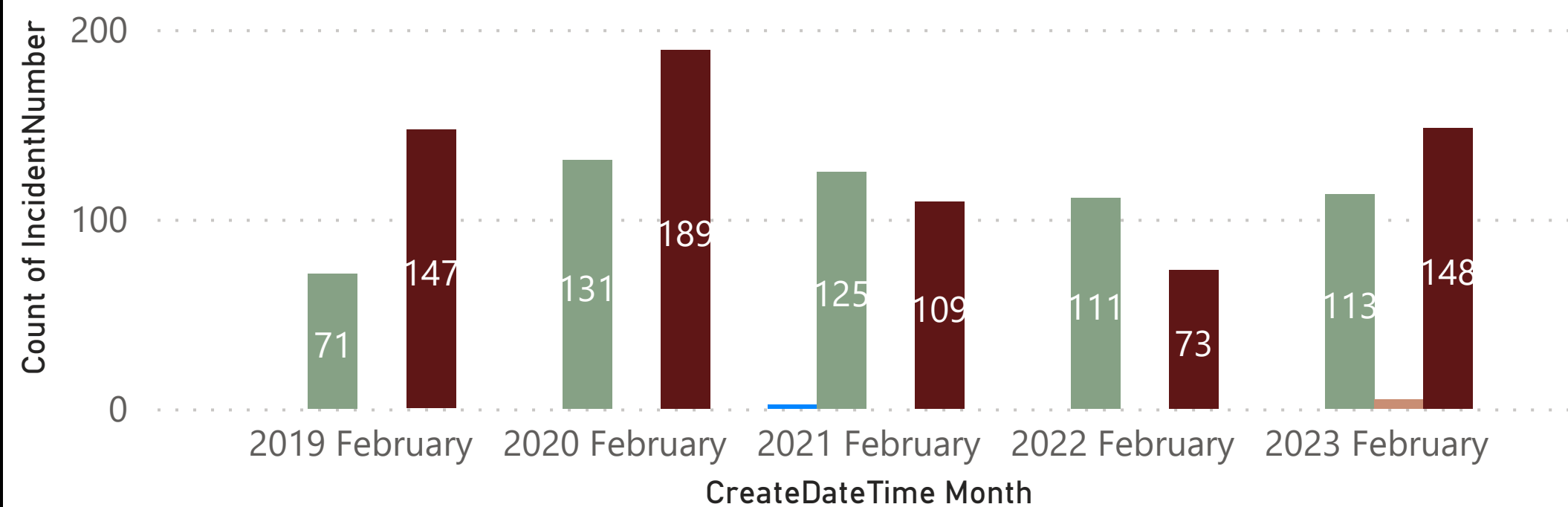

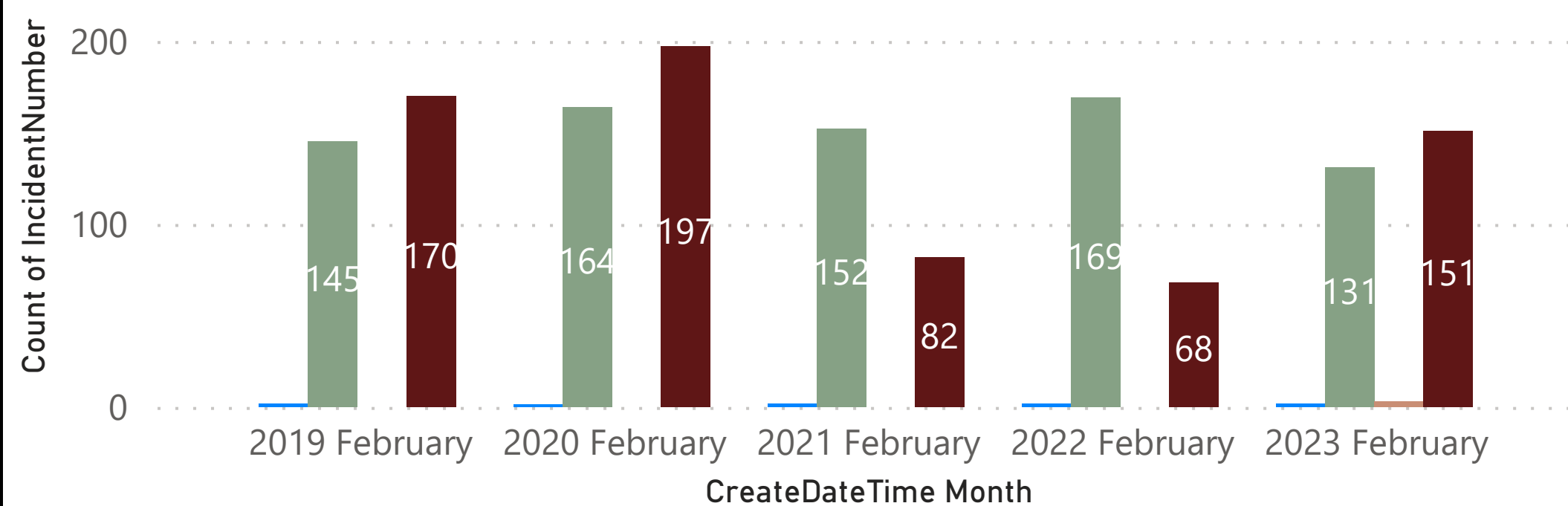
Stanwood West, Incidents by Origination

Stanwood East, Incidents by Origination

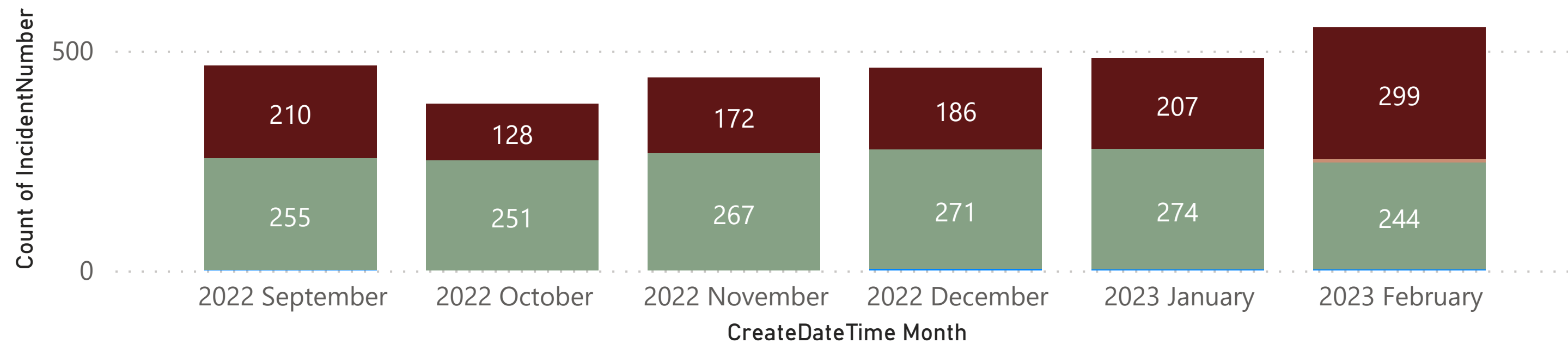

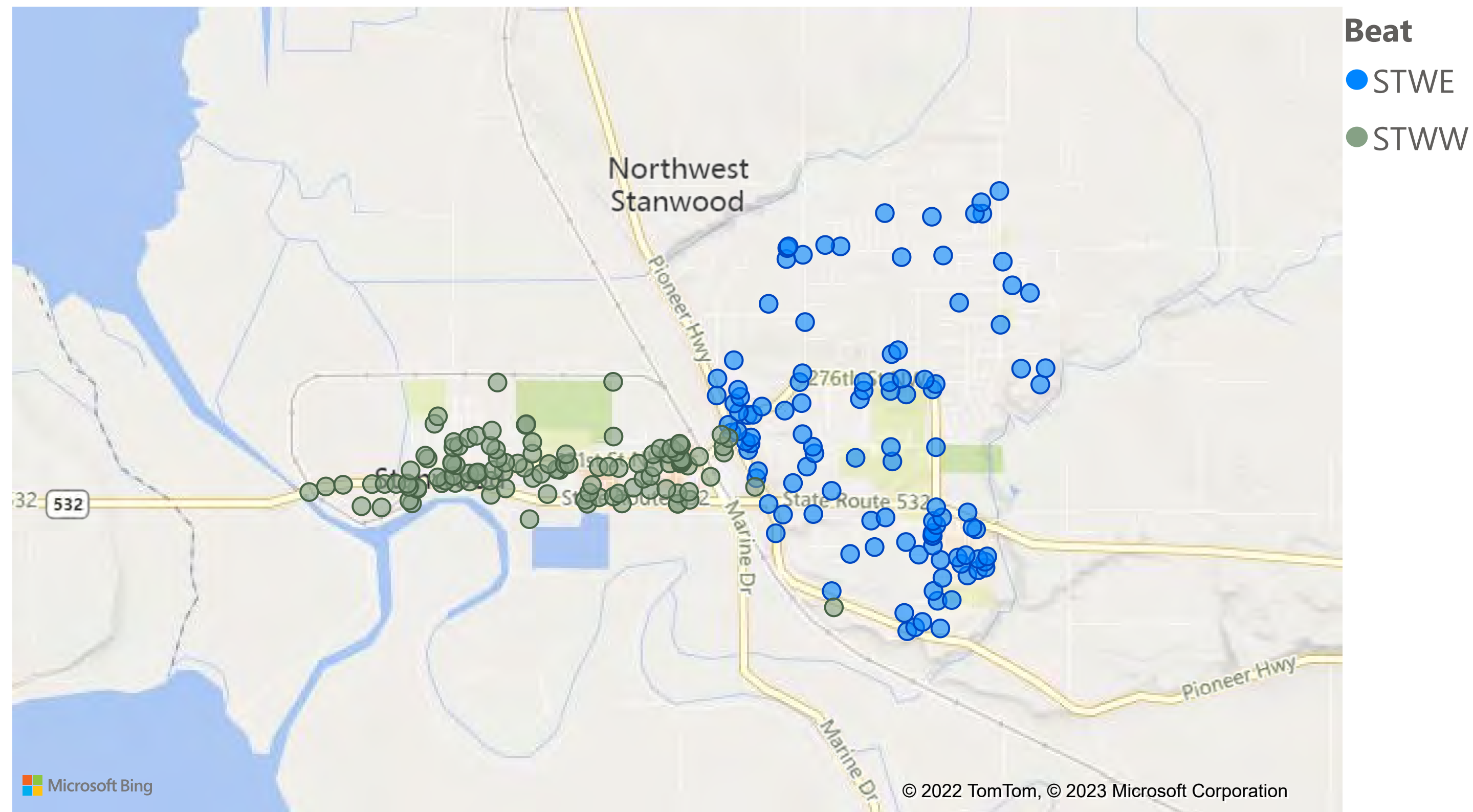

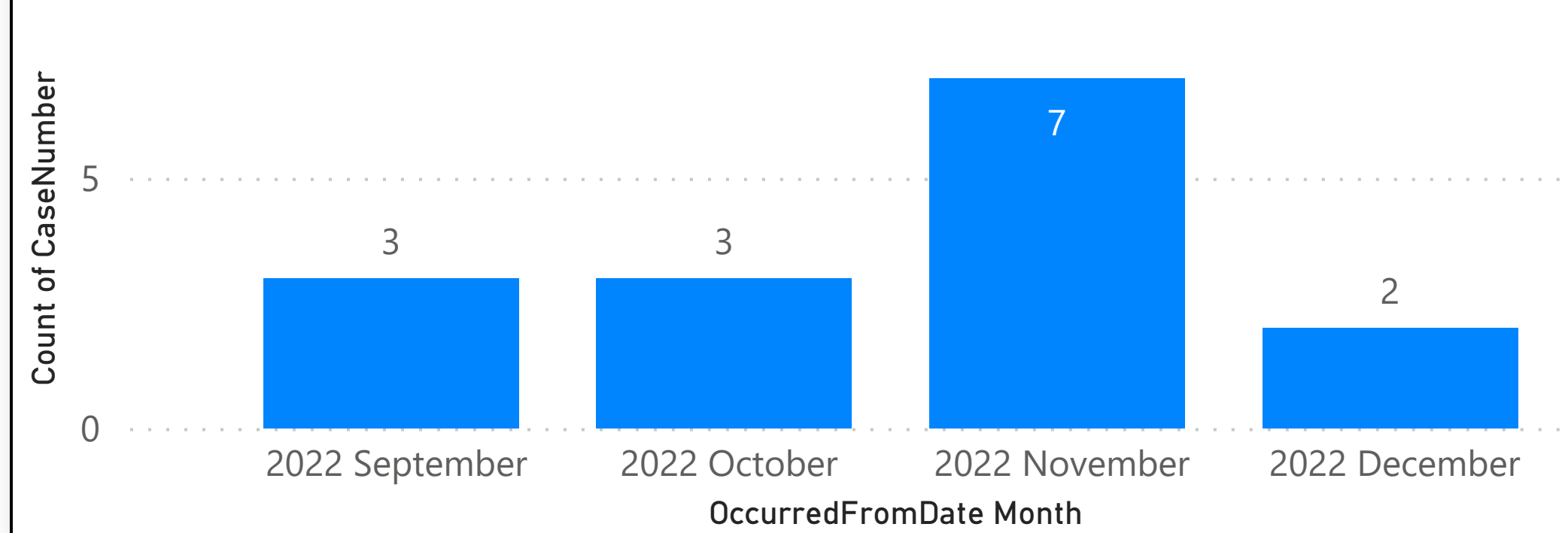

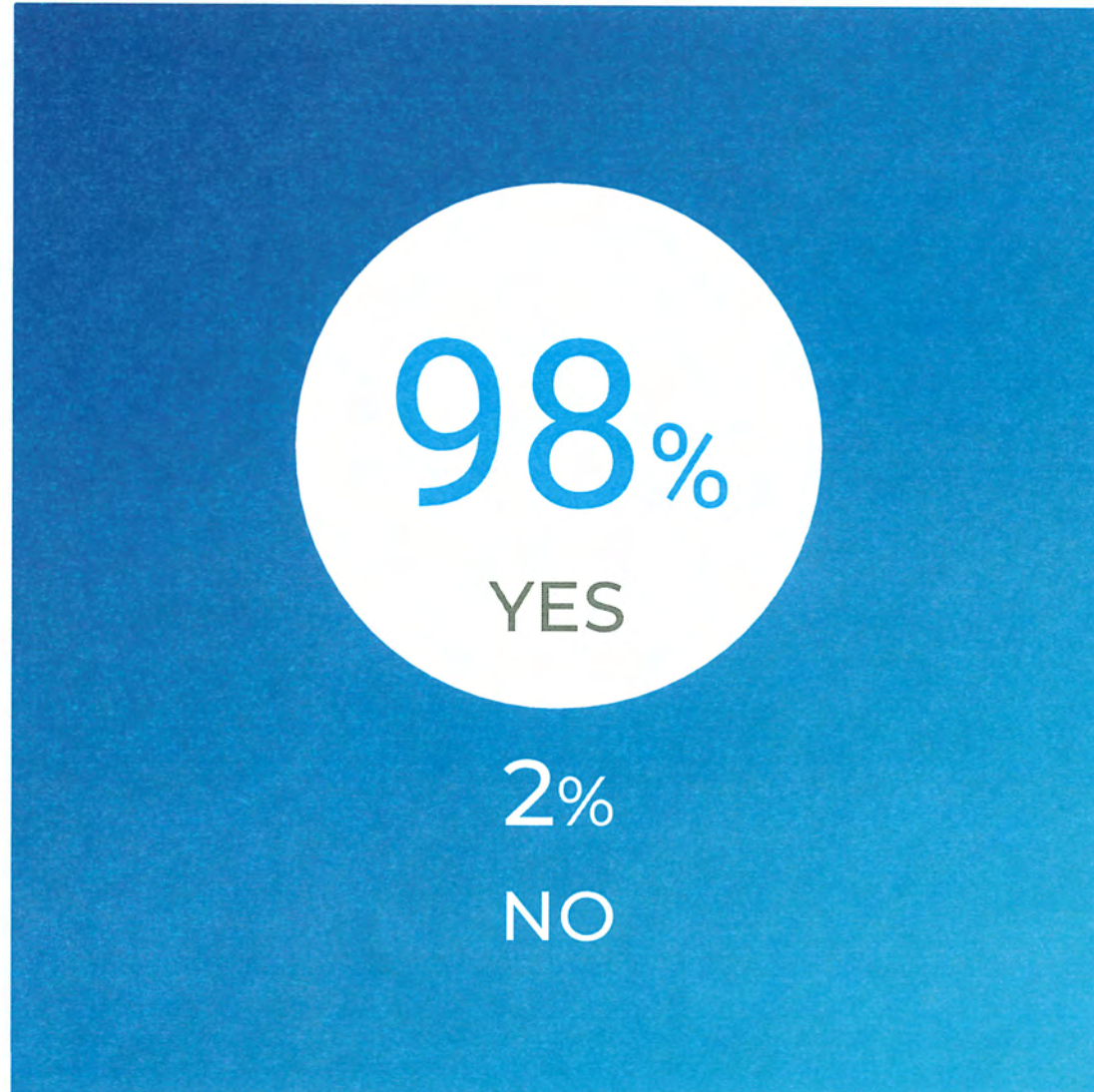

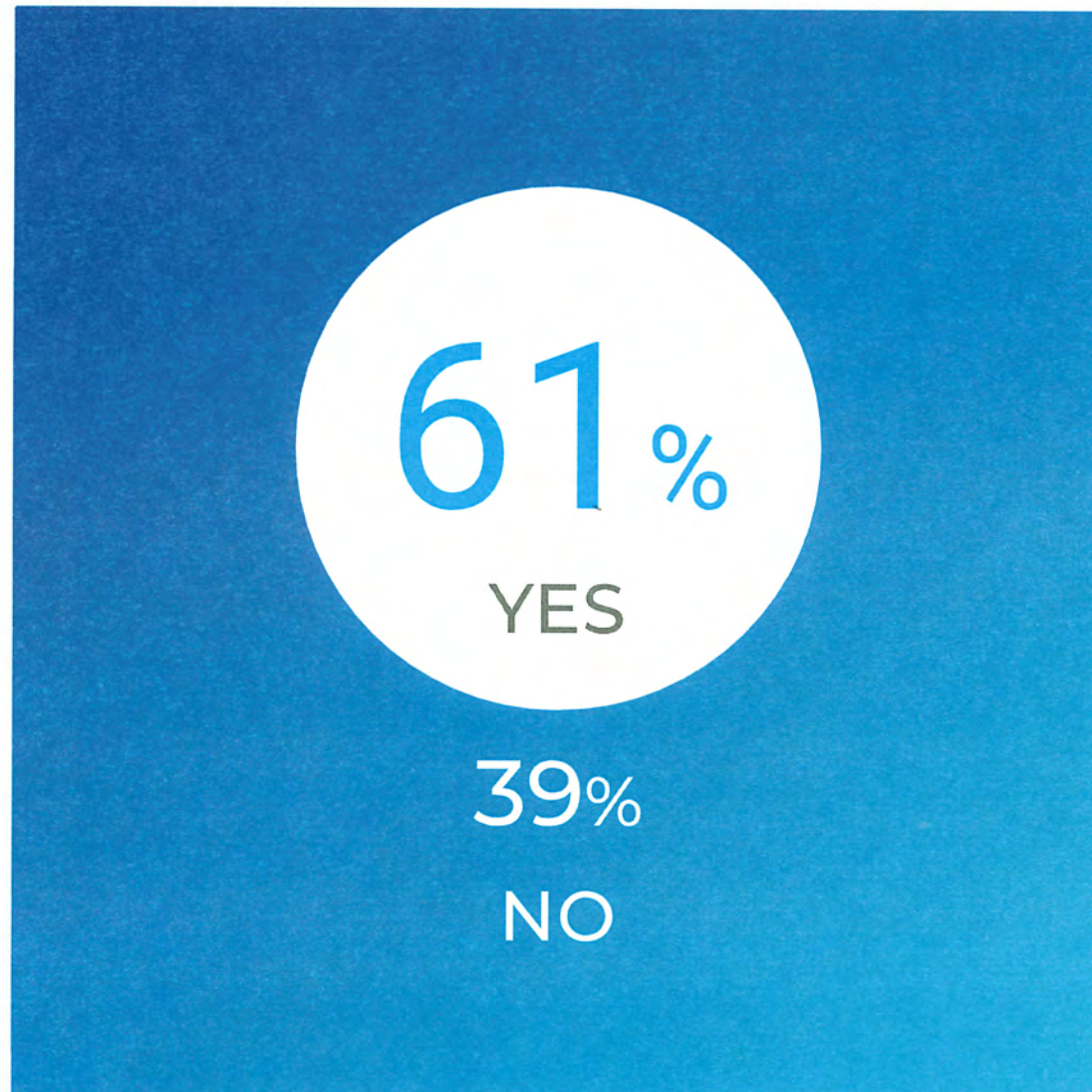

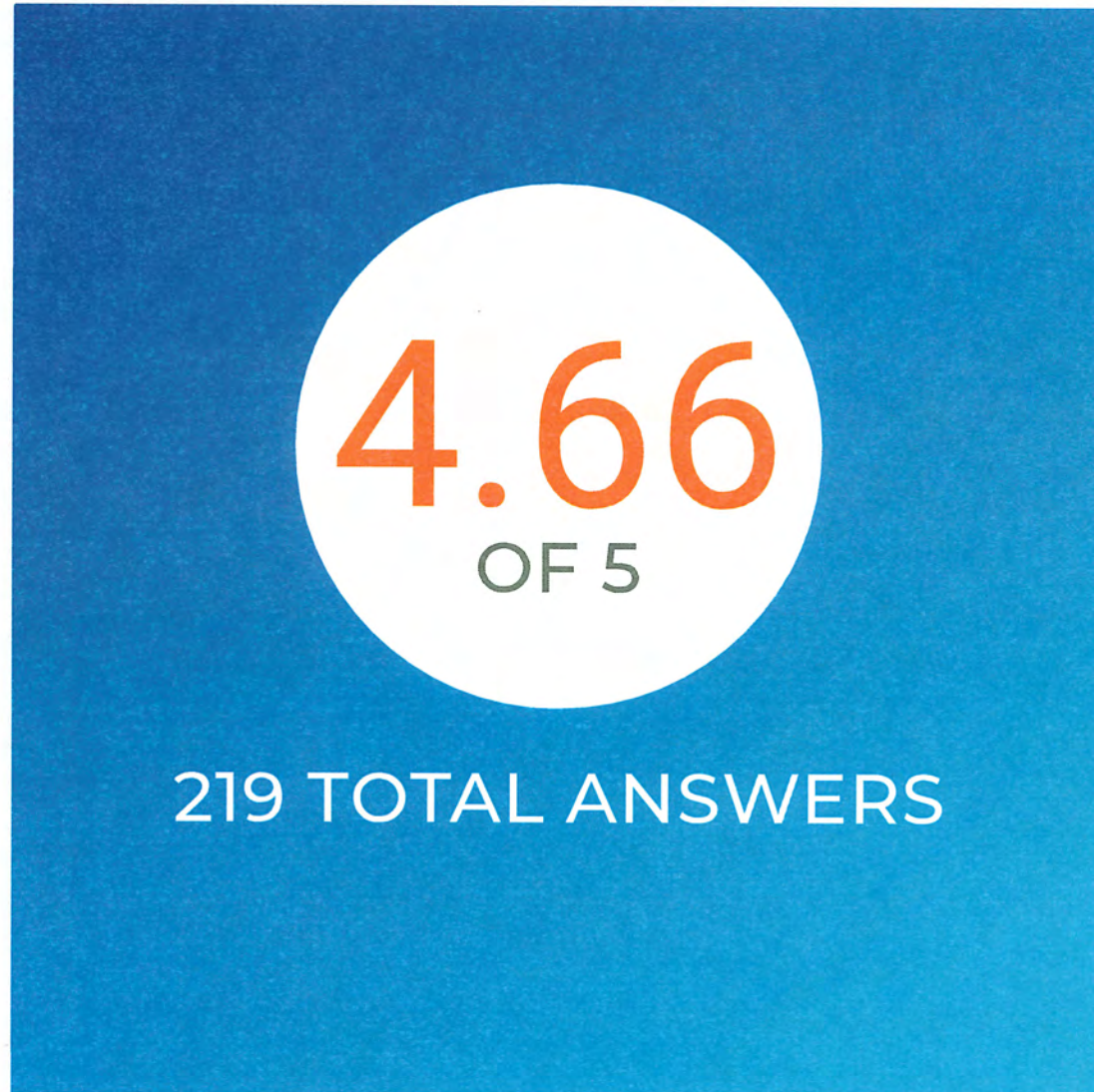

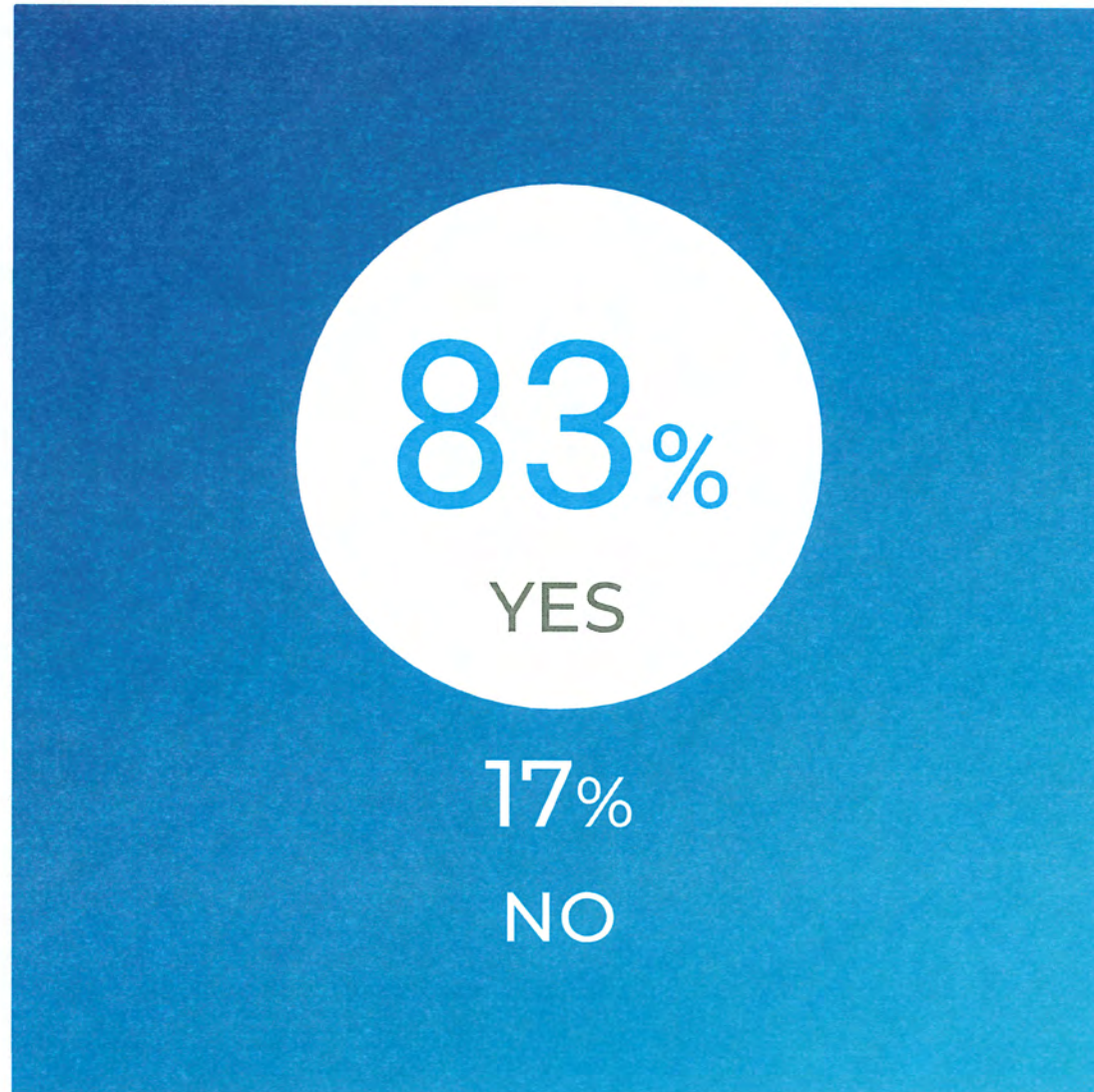
